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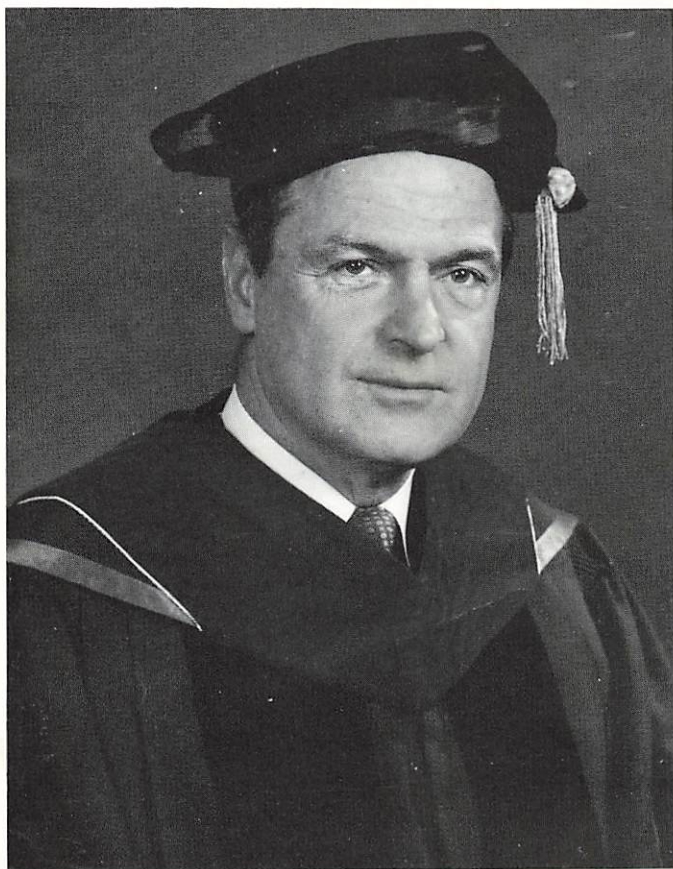

THE PRESIDENT'S PERSPECTIVE

The yearbook staff asked me to write an article comparing the 1910 spirit of the C.E.I. campus with campus life today. After explaining that I wasn't there in 1910, I did agree to comment on the situations of 1910 and later as I have read about them, and what I observe today.

Students came to Chicago in the early days from many parts of America. They came by train, car and bus. Because of the great distances and time needed to travel, there were not the frequent trips home. Most of the students worked and most had few of this world's riches. There seemed to have been a closeness, a family spirit that manifested itself at the three-a-day family style meals, recreation, cultural events and spiritual life opportunities. Singing was a

constant expression of faith and joy, especially at the family meals. Holidays were more festive campus events than today, partially because few could afford to travel home. These observations are not to idealize the past as being more desirable than now. The leanness and sparsity of the times produced a robust faith but also took a toll on human endurance and health and welfare.

The similarities of yesteryear and today are the more important things, the eternal things. Many of the early faculty/staff served without promise of pay and lived on the barest of necessities. The depth of the dedication was without question. We find that same spirit today and if conditions called for it again, there are those here who undoubtedly would respond in similar fashion. One still needs to be "called" to serve at Vennard.

The students appear to me to be younger. (Of course, there is a logical explanation for that. They are younger!) Students today have more knowledge about more things but don't have any more wisdom. Students at Vennard today are as called, committed and ready to respond to the challenges of the Kingdom as at any other time.

There is an intangibility, an indefinable mystique we now call "the Vennard Way". There is a manner of conduct, a stance that identifies one as belonging to the Vennard family. It is that same spirit that was characteristic of the C.E.I. man and woman of the early days. It is a life built upon the clarity of biblical teaching, the doctrinal position of the college as established by Dr. Vennard, the emphasis upon holiness of heart and life. These have not changed.

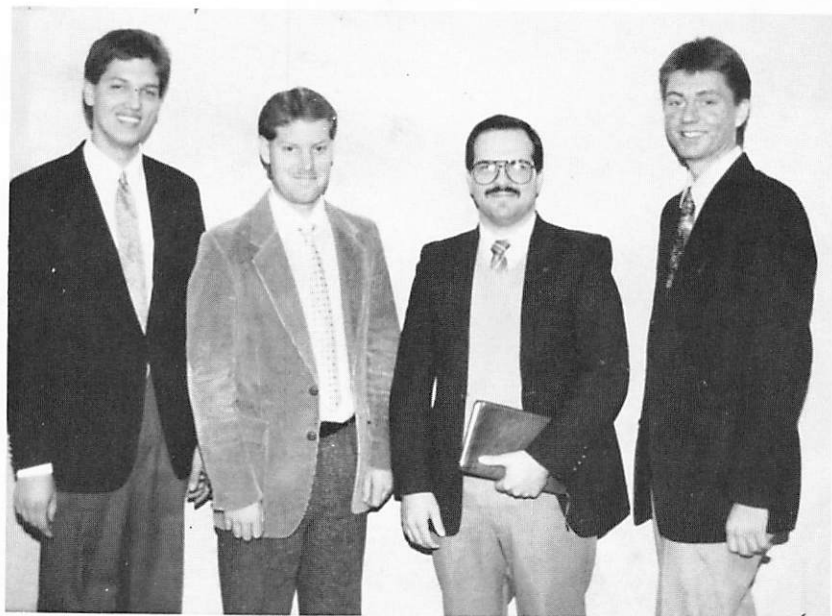

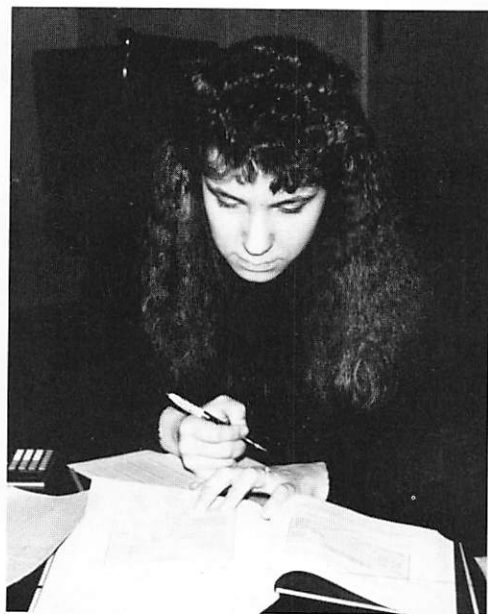
ACADEMICS

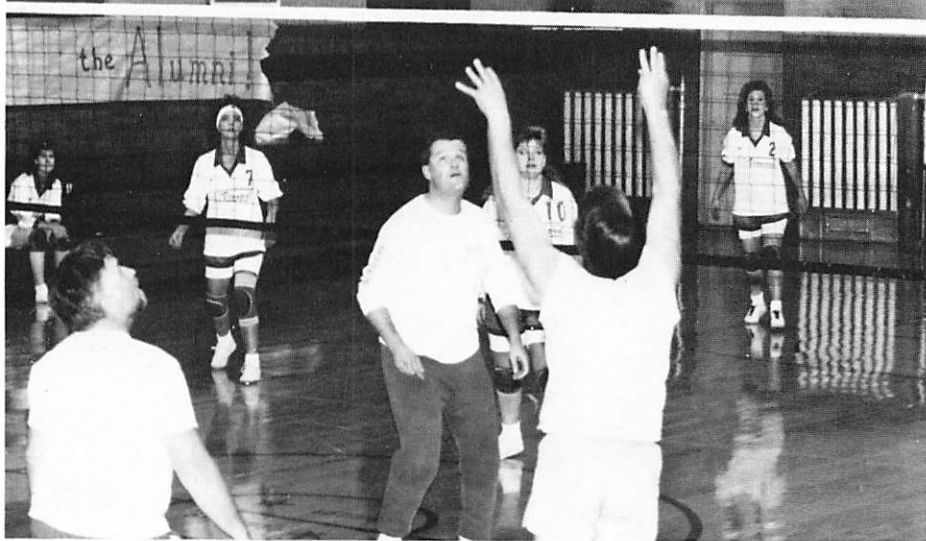

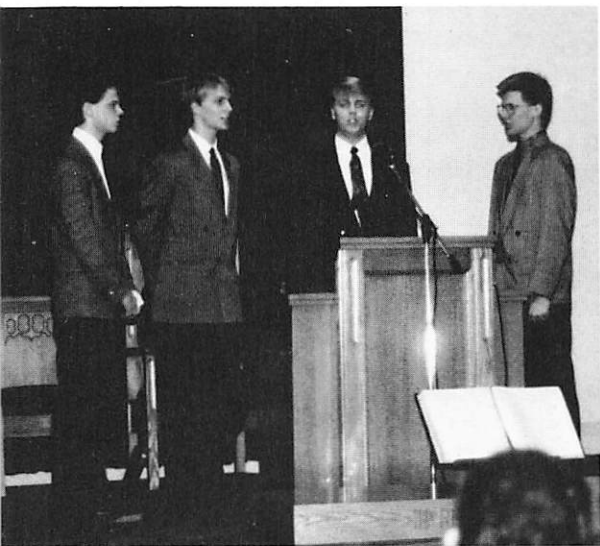

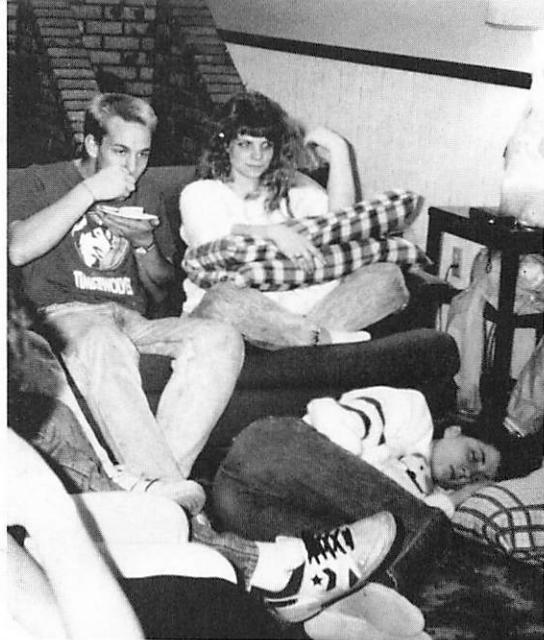

Robert Gary Klucas was born September 18, 1942, to Sylvan and Dorothy Klucas. He and his three sisters were raised on a dairy farm in North Central Minnesota. "Bobby" spent many hours working in the fields despite his hay fever. He received his early education in a one room school-house and he remembers being the most outstanding student in his fourth grade class. The Klucas family attended a Church of the Nazarene in a small farming community nearby.

When Bob graduated from high school he took machine design at technical school. After graduating from there he worked for Olson Construction Co. of Wadena, MN, and on June 13, 1964 he married his boss' daughter, Valera Olson, his high-school sweetheart.

Bob and Valera made their home in Wadena where they were members of the Holiness Methodist Church — which soon became a part of the Evangelical Church of North America. 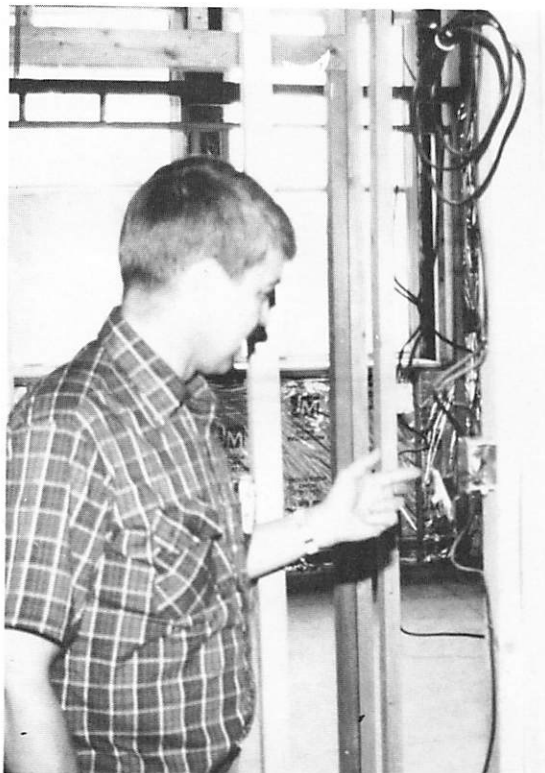

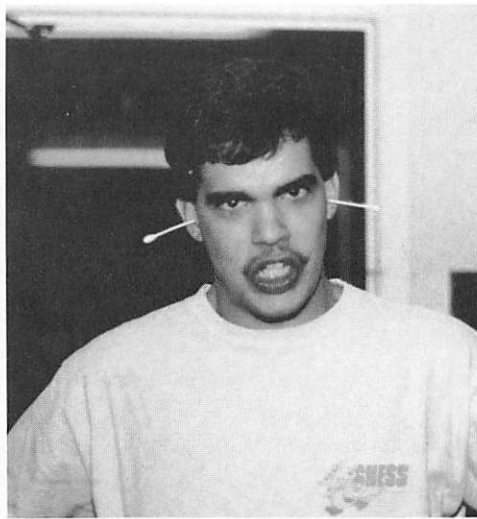

FALL REVIVAL A STUDENT'S PERSPECTIVE

From September 11-15, we were privileged to have Rev. Dale Dorothy come as the guest speaker for the Fall revival services. Rev. Dorothy has served as a missionary in Haiti with World Gospel Mission, and is currently stationed at the mission headquarters in Marion, Indiana. Along with our speaker, we were happy to have Gerald and Linda Schwabb as our music evangelists. They worked well together and were sensitive to the needs of the congregation in the area of song ministry. Their sincerity impressed me as appropriate, especially for my own needs.

The theme of the week was "The Will of God". There were nine services in all, and each one touched upon a different aspect of God's will. They ranged from knowing what God's will is in our lives to making sure that we are following what we already know is right for us.

Rev. Dorothy was a sensitive speaker who spoke from his heart. What he said was so straightforward and clear, that I, as a student, was able to follow him and still sit back and let the Holy Spirit work in my heart.

It was obvious that I was not the only person being spoken to during the services. Every night, and most mornings, ended with the altar lined with people. It was special for me to watch the Lord working in the lives of my friends, teachers, and other faculty/staff. It helped me realize how much the Lord was speaking, whether through a first-time commitment or through a rededication and submission to His call.

Our last service began with an hour of praises from anyone being spoken to. This proved to me that the Spirit was very definitely present and working through the messages He gave to our evangelists and that, if only half of the people had responded, it still would have been a very significant revival.

4. Missionary Mystery - His Spirit will go with us

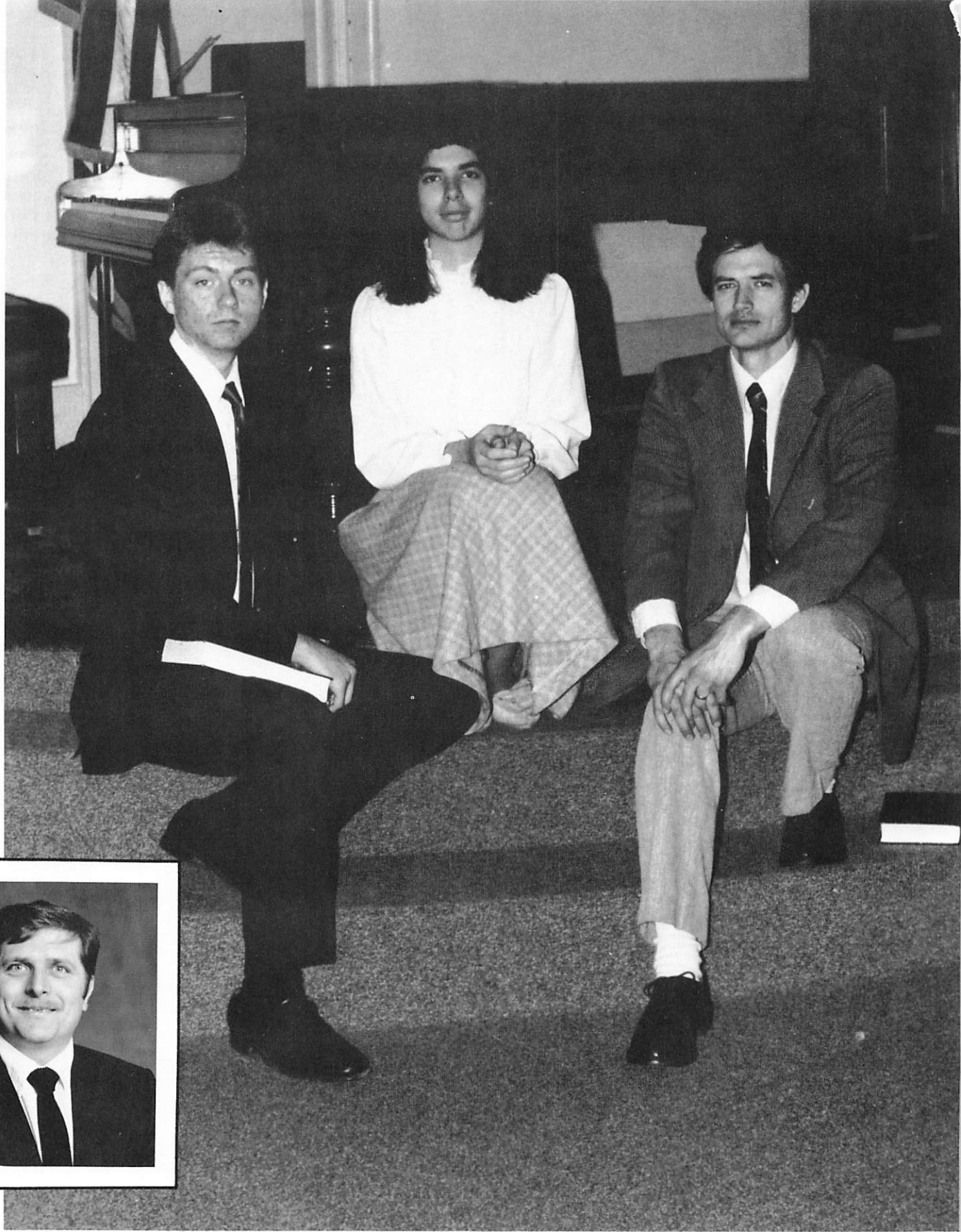

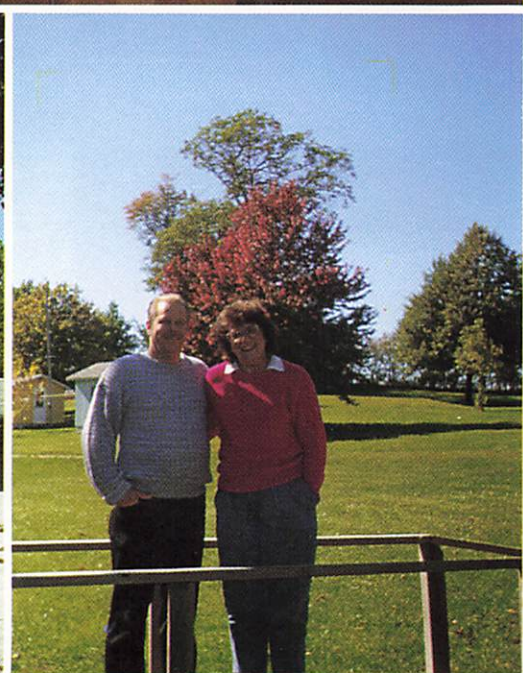
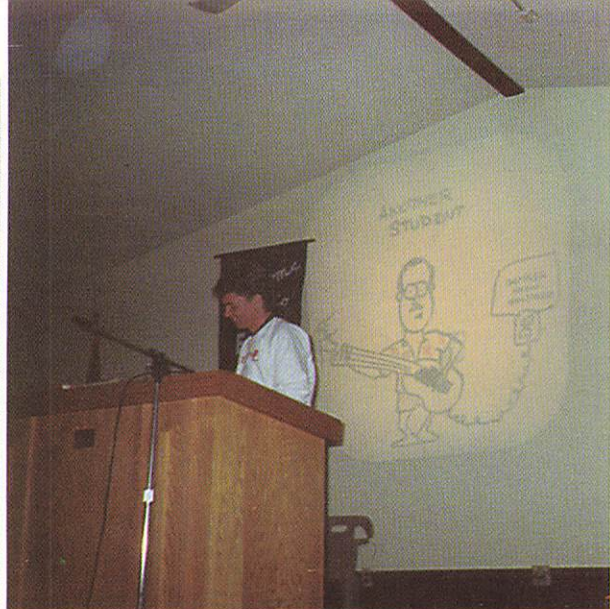
Linda Stateler is finishing her degree in Bible/Missions/Urban Ministries. Linda enjoys helping people, particularly those less fortunate than herself.

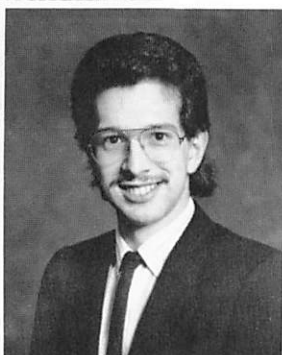
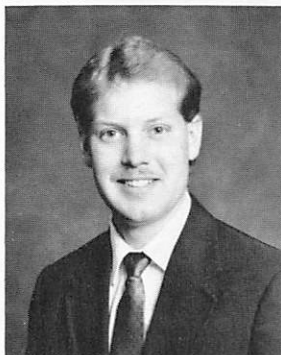




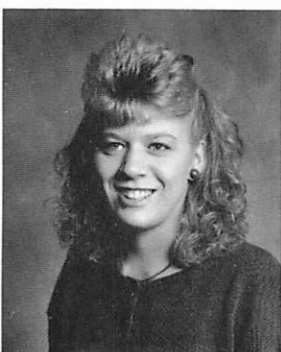
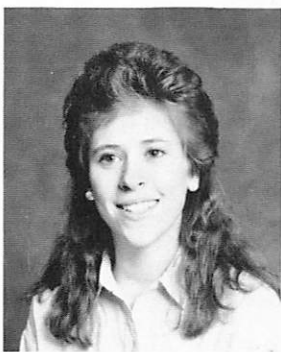
NON-GRADUATING SENIORS

Tim Hawk, a 1968 graduate of Vennard College, currently serving as Director of Youth Connection Ministries with W.G.M., spoke directly to our hearts during our winter revival.

Tim spoke to us about change. He said, "Change is something that makes a difference by substituting one thing for another. The only way to change our world is to change lives. Before a lump of clay can become a work of art in the potter's hands, it has to be submissive."

His sermon from Romans 8:26-29 concerning how we can know God's will as inspiring and worth remembering.

- Confess all sin - clear the pathway.
- Have patience - refuse to be rushed.
- Don't give into pressure
- Pray persistently.
- Look for promises in God's word.
- Find peace. - Col. 3:15

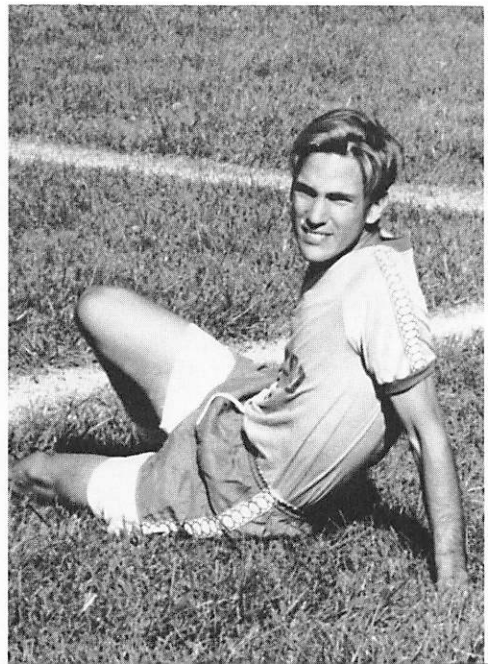
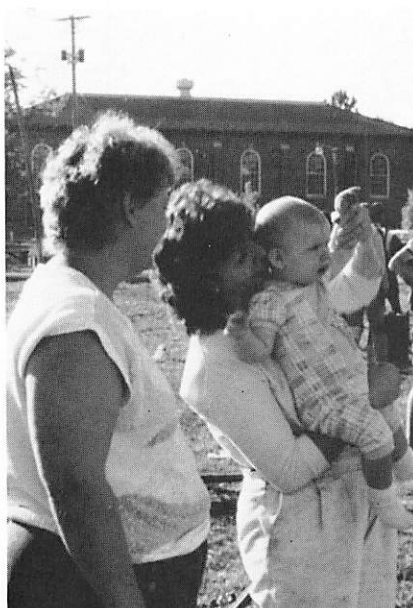
VENNARD SOCCER CLUB

Leaving campus on May 28, Paul and Trudy Lund journeyed to Haiti as group leaders for nine Vennardians. Mr. Lund said that it was a time for his students to experience what life is like in an underprivileged country. For the Lunds, it was a time to visit the area where they began their missionary career in 1961 and worked until 1964.

Traveling under the auspices of OMS International, based in Greenwood, Indiana, the Vennard students were given the opportunity to take this trip as a one or two-credit hour course.

Haiti was extremely hot with temperatures in the mid-90's. When asked what was most striking concerning this trip, Kevin Klucas responded, "The extreme poverty. The air was filled with the smell of garbage, because there were so many people so close together. In contrast,

the people were so clean. We could tell that no matter what their status, they had a real pride in themselves."

Haiti is known as the poorest country in the Western Hemisphere, and is also a place of political unrest. Upon arriving in Port-au-Prince, Mr. Lund said, "In some respects the city looked like a war zone - reminiscent of Beirut Lebanon." In fact, because of a near threat of anarchy and mob violence, the Vennard group did not tour much of downtown Port-au-Prince.

Concerning the people of Haiti, the students found them to be warm and friendly. Cyndy Reeves recalled attending an open-air prayer meeting in which the Haitians got up and gave the visitors their blankets to sit on so they wouldn't have to sit on the ground. "They were so excited about being Christians," she said.

When asked if they would make a

return trip to Haiti the answer was a most resounding, "Yes!"



MISSION EXPERIENCE CONVINCES CHAPMAN

Terry Chapman, one of the members traveling with the mission group, said of the trip, "Impressive!" He was gripped by the poverty that was obvious everywhere. The cost of

living is extremely high with a pint bottle of syrup costing over \$6.00.

The staple diet of the Haitians is red beans, rice, fruit, and bread. Rather than raise enough food to feed their families, the Haitians opt for cash crops such as cotton and coffee.

Terry told of visiting a voodoo village (see picture) and handing out tracts. While there are churches everywhere, witchcraft is very prevalent.

Terry was impressed by the strength and faithfulness of the Christians who are poor. They did not have money to give, but they gave harvest offerings of produce that could be sold to raise cash for their building fund.

Terry is convinced that everyone should experience missions firsthand.

Short on funds? Most of our students are, but how wonderful to watch God work in response to the letters that were sent out to family and friends. All needs were met, and right on time!

No habla Espanol? Me either. But armed with a few choice phrases provided in our Task Force journal and an inexpensive Spanish/English dictionary, we managed (along with many hand signs) to make ourselves understood. When that failed we solicited the help of the Dunbars and the Farnums. Besides, love knows no language barrier, and it was obvious to the Saltillo Mexicans that we loved Jesus and them.

The Saltillo church is filled with wonderfully warm, generous, and loving Christians. The children are delightful and their youth a joy. Many tears were shed by Americans and our new South-of-the-border friends when we parted.

I was afraid the Mexican food would be too spicy, and some of it was, but the hot stuff is often served as an option. Ellen Dunbar fixed the most delicious meals, and we all ate heartily.

One warning drilled into us before going to Mexico was, "Don't drink the water!" I think somebody did, because they came down with the disease we commonly label as "Heidi's Syndrome." Actually, bottled water was provided so we did not dehydrate.

Are you afraid of flying? Frankly, I prefer my feet planted squarely on terra firma, but some places are more accessible by plane, especially if time is limited. So then, you fly on a faith and that faith is rewarded by God's faithfulness. We had a wonderful trip.

Who would I recommend to go on Task Force and VIA trips? Well, missions majors, of course! If you are called to missions, experiencing it firsthand will confirm it. And pastoral ministry students need to experience missions in order to be a positive influence on their parishioners for missions support. Laymen? Sure, they need this "missions connection" for several reasons. I can pray better now that I have been to Mexico. The "throngs" have names and faces now. Seeing missions first hand helps set proper financial priorities. Lastly, my missions giving has improved because of a reassessment of those priorities.

So who's left out of this mission experience? The unsaved are and that's what missions is all about!

Do I have any regrets? Yes, that I waited over half a century before experiencing missions in another culture firsthand.

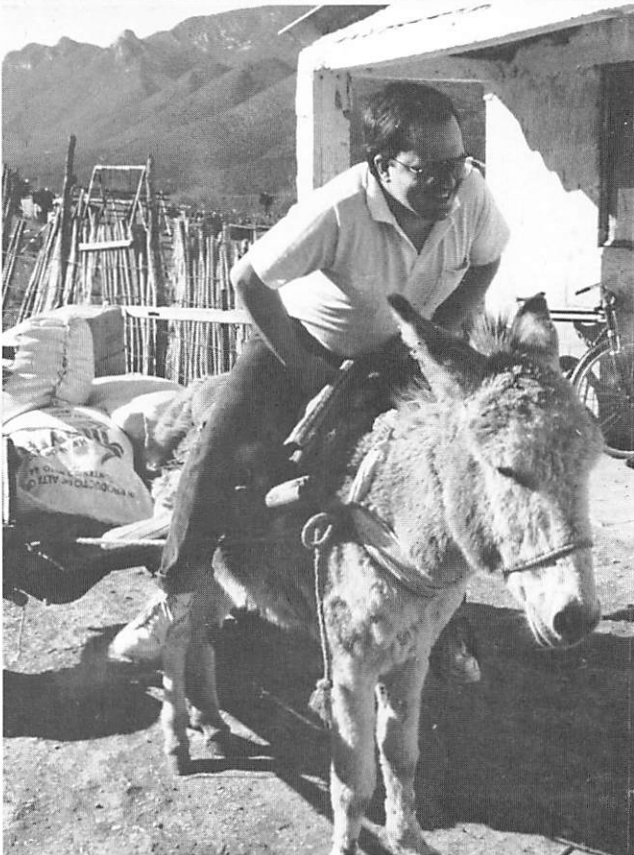

Sharon is surprised and pleased at her acceptance by the students at Vennard. Surprised, because she's a "bit" older than most; and pleased because friendship is so important to her.

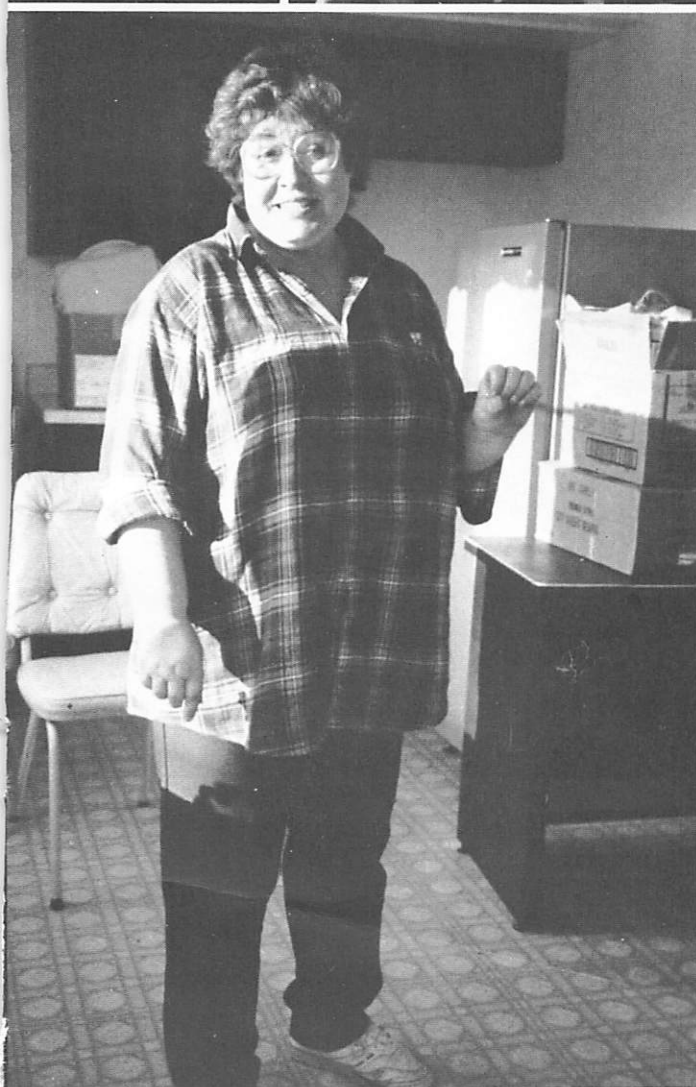

Sharon Eaton is a single parent who also has a 15 year old son, Ryan. He lives with his father in Washington state.



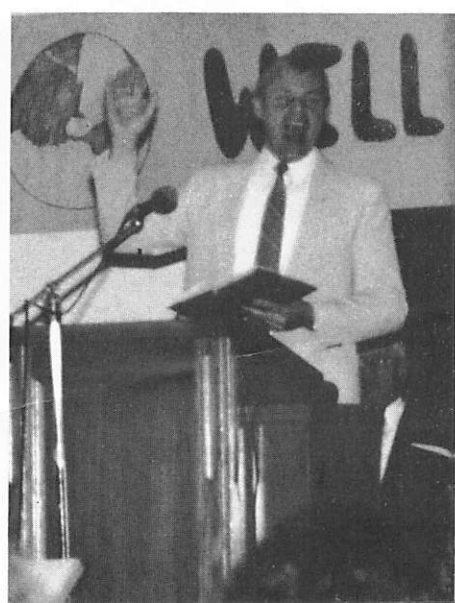
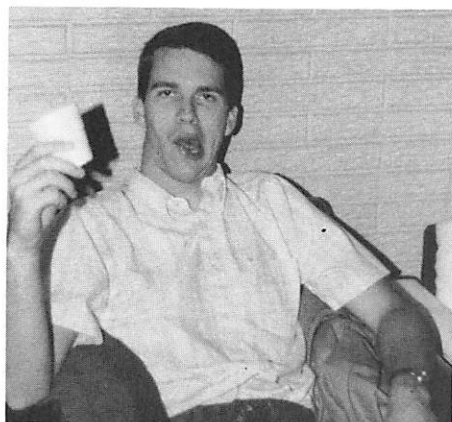
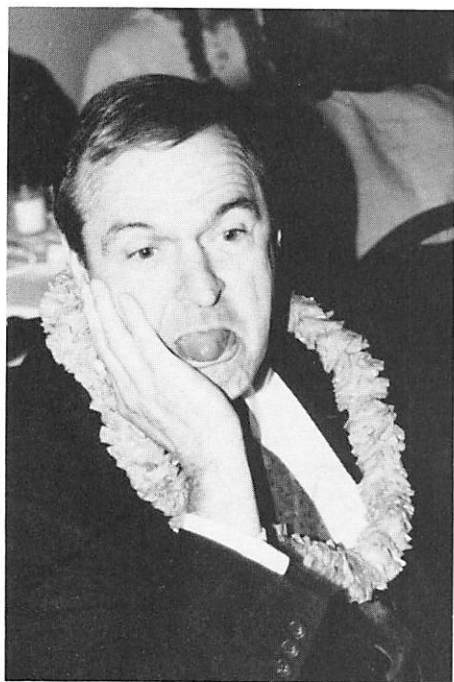

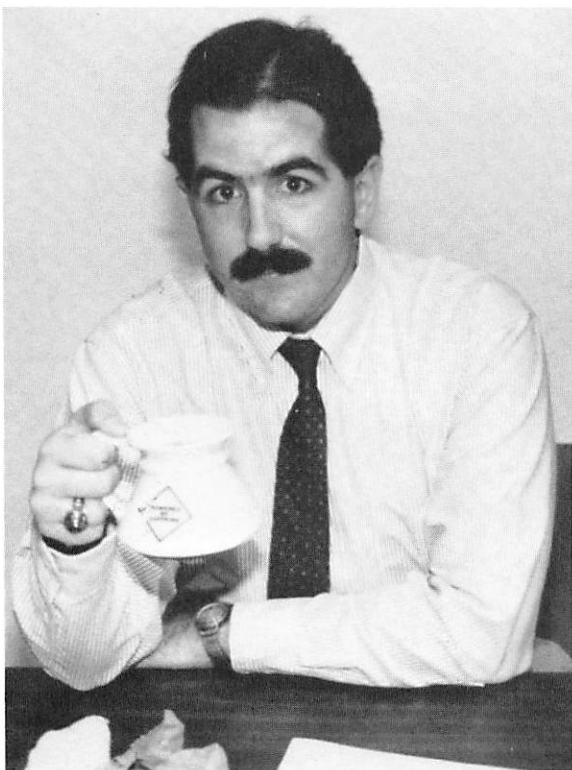

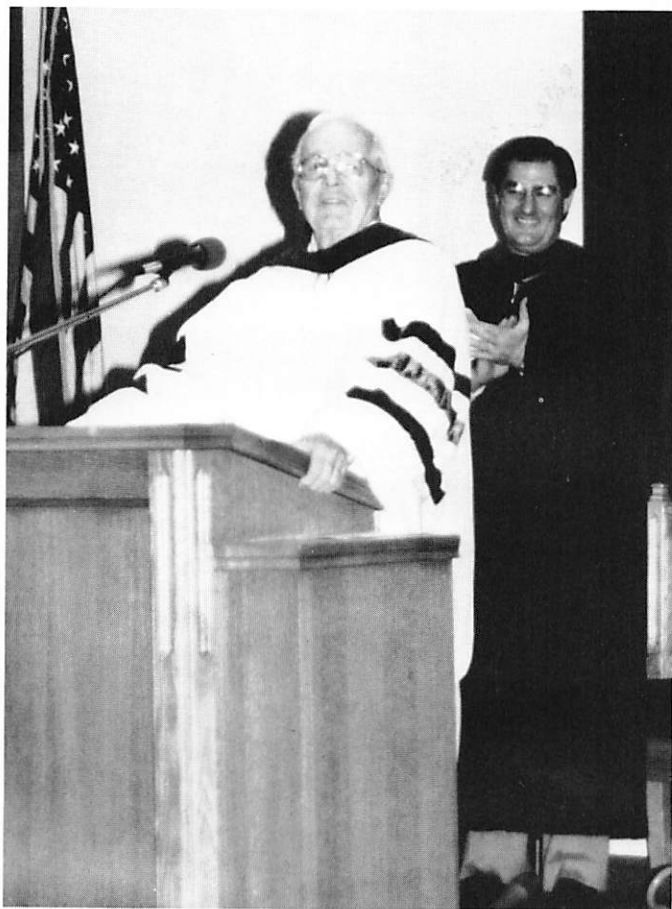


"Holiness is the basis of Biblical reality. The final word to us comes through the name of Jesus who came to tie the two worlds together.

"An emotion is a non-sensory structure. It cannot be handled by the scientific method of the senses - sight, sound, smell, taste and touch.

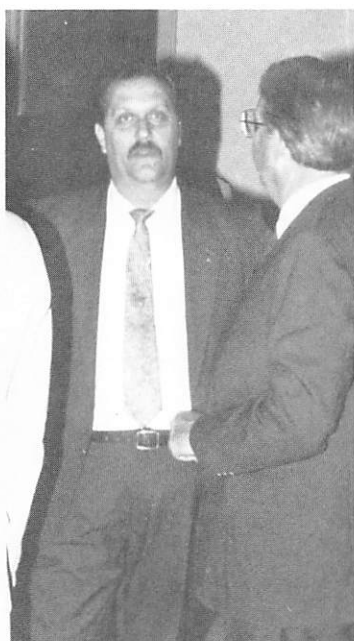
"What do we do about loneliness? Get involved ... for the Christian never walks alone."

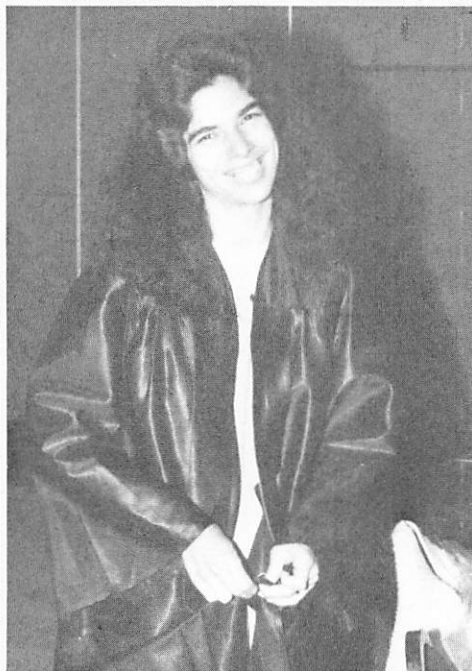

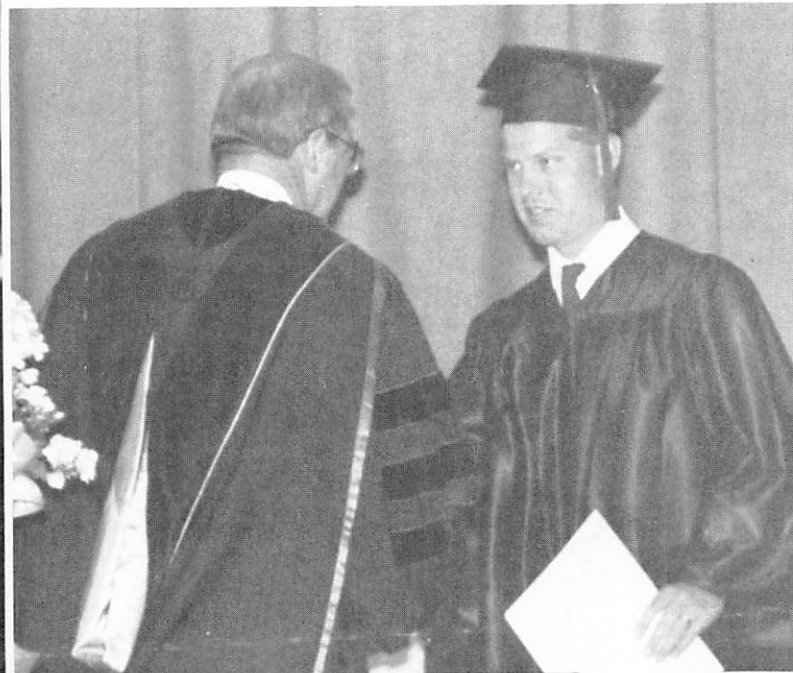
Families and friends had gathered to celebrate this milestone in their lives and no amount of rain could dampen the spirit of those festivities.

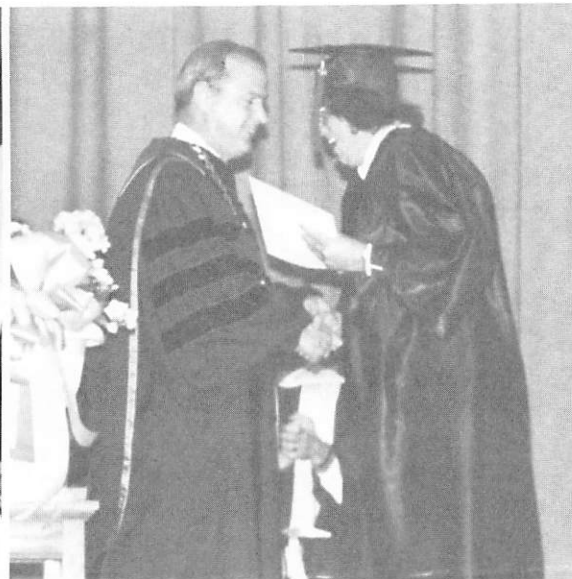

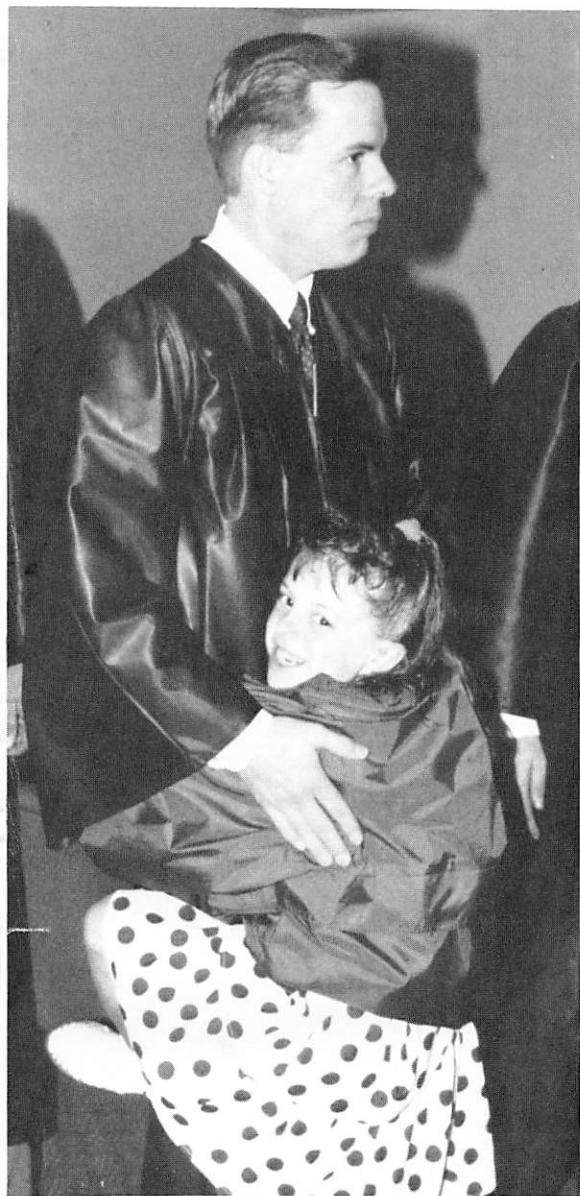

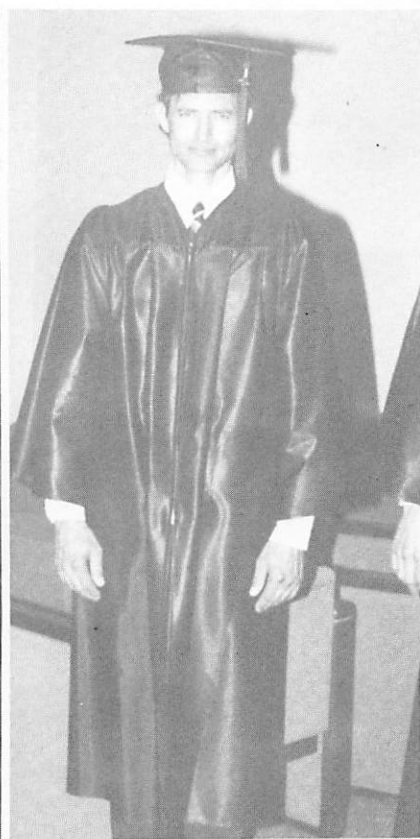
