At the midyear meeting of the Kletzing McLaughlin Memorial Foundation College Board, Dr. John Paul and Dr. C. W. Butler resigned their membership in this body. Dr. Gideon Williamson of Kansas City and Rev. Remiss Rehfeldt, Nazarene District Superintendent of the Iowa Conference, were chosen to fill the vacancies. Dr. Williamson was elected chairman of the board succeeding Dr. Paul. Mr. H. M. Coats of University Park remains the third member of the group. After being associated with school systems for twenty-five years, ten of these at Kletzing College, Dr. C. W. Butler has tendered his resignation effective May 31, 1946. Dr. R. H. Cantrell, now superintendent of the Minnesota district of the Church of the Nazarene, has been chosen to succeed him.
