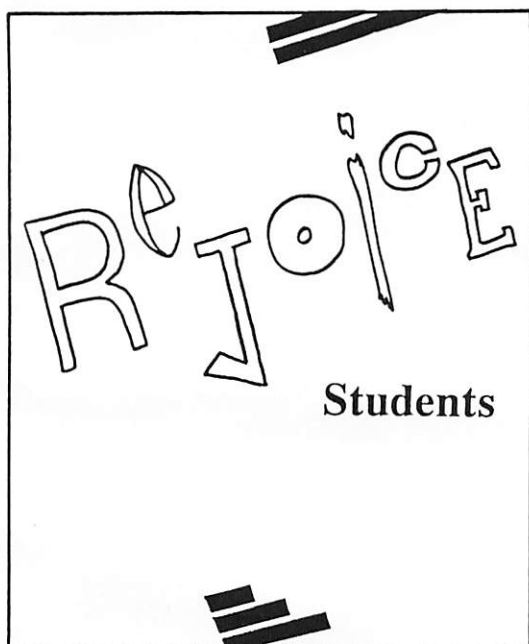
M. S. A.

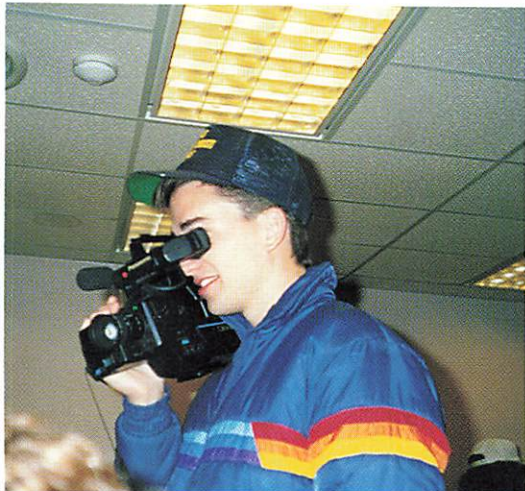

When the C. E. class needed to raise money for a special project someone suggested a pie throwing contest. The students thought, "What a a sweet idea!"

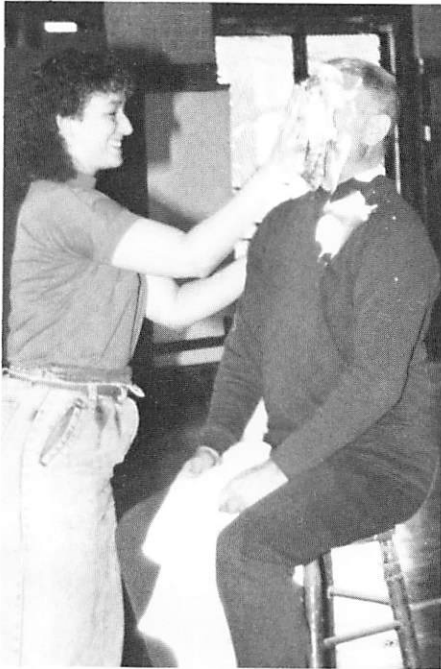

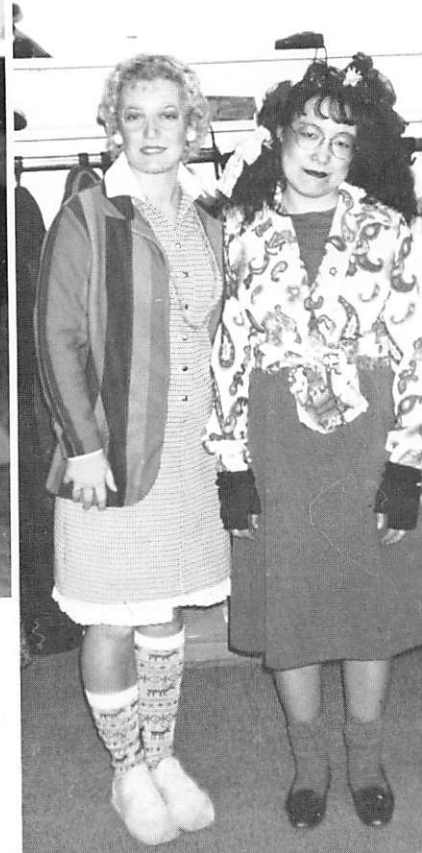

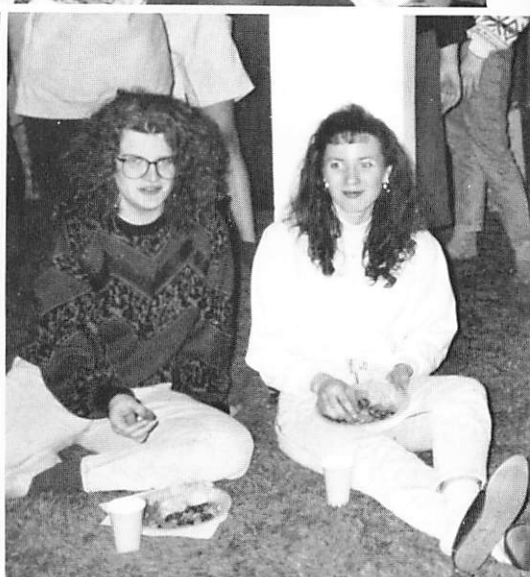

Ex-Marine Confidently Faces Unknown

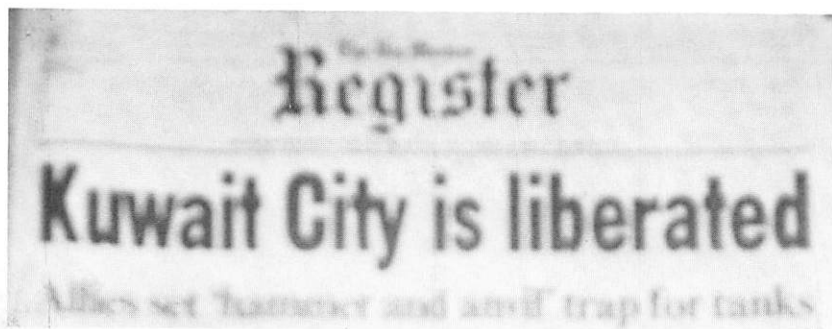


When David Smith came back from Germany to be a student at Vennard he felt it would be safe to join the local National Guard.

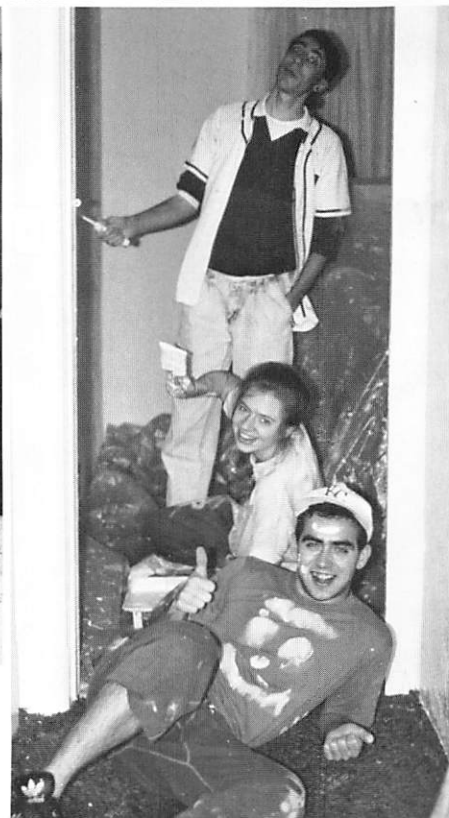

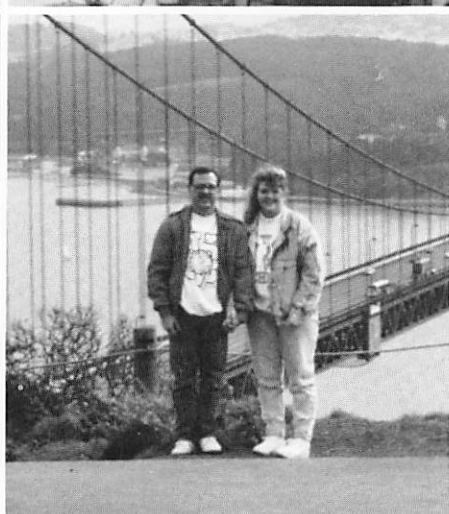

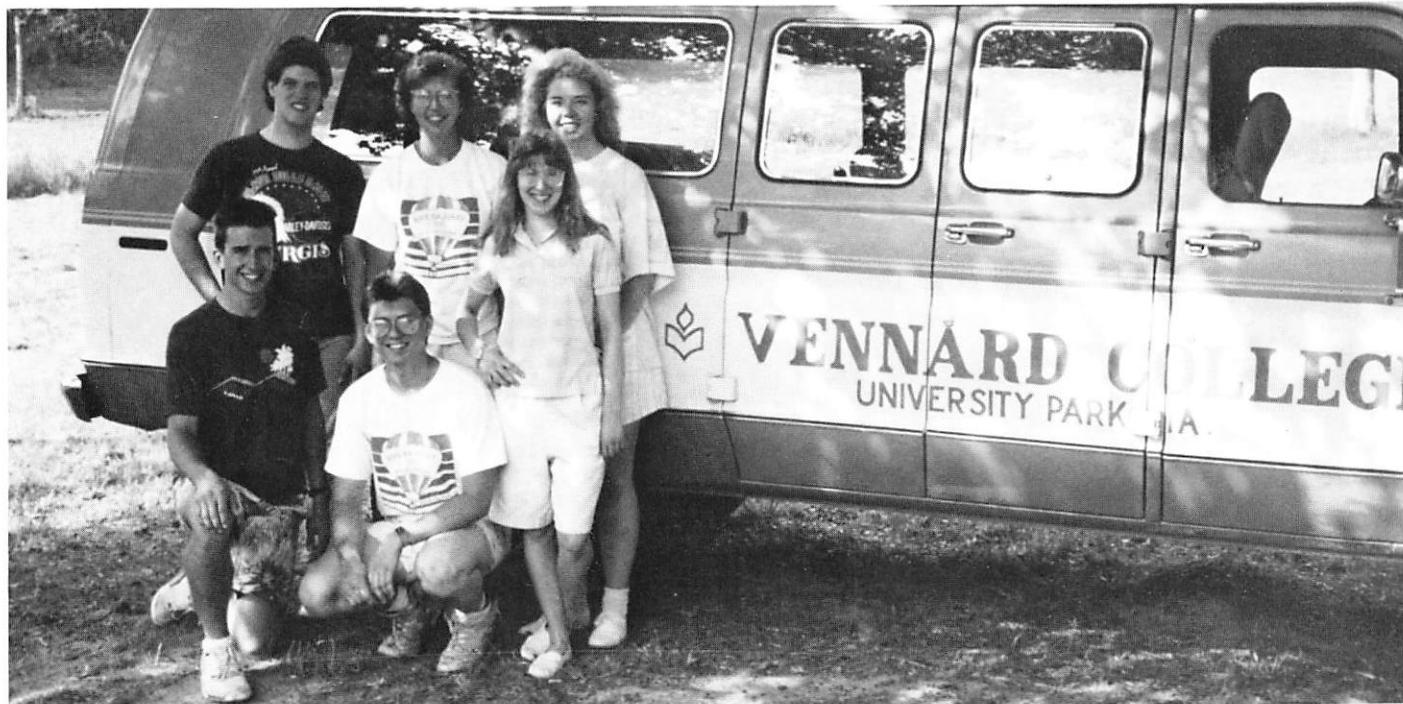
Ecuador Beckons Becky Boese

needed, his shoulder to cry on.

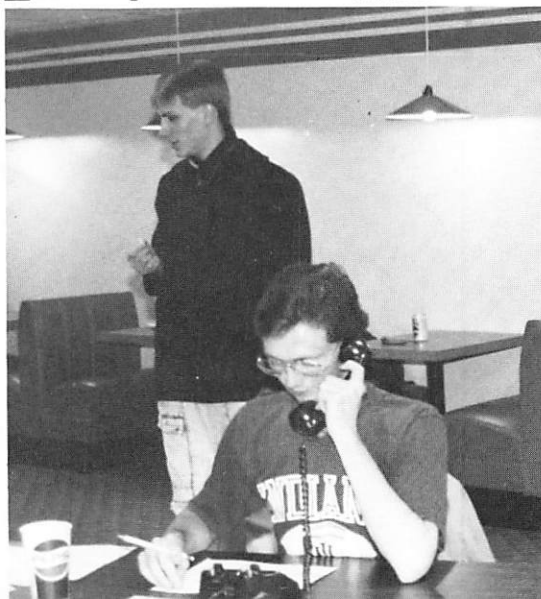
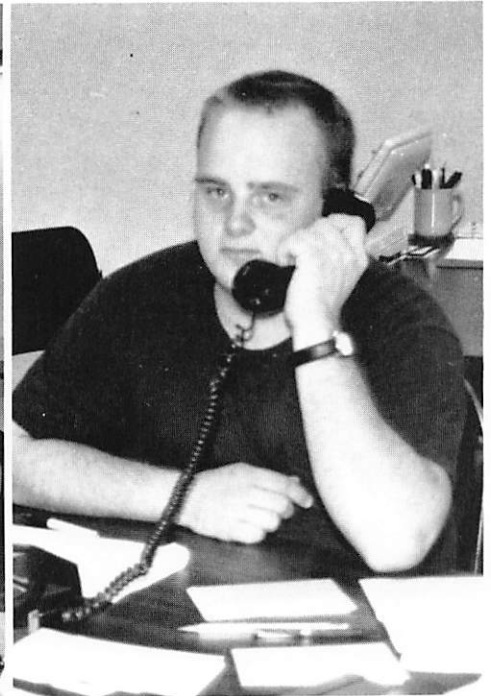

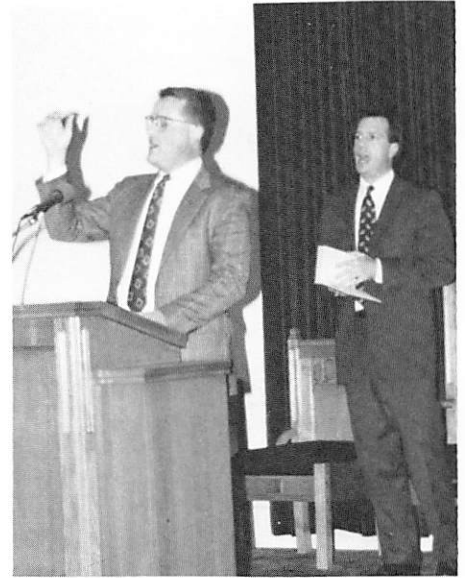
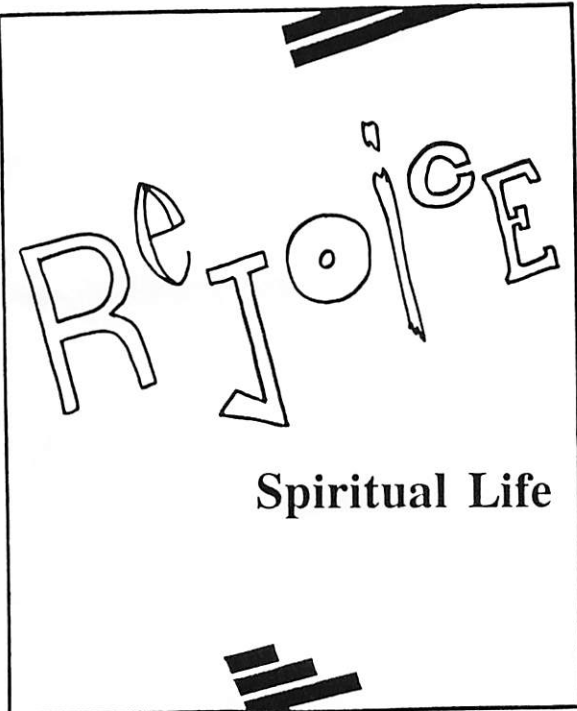
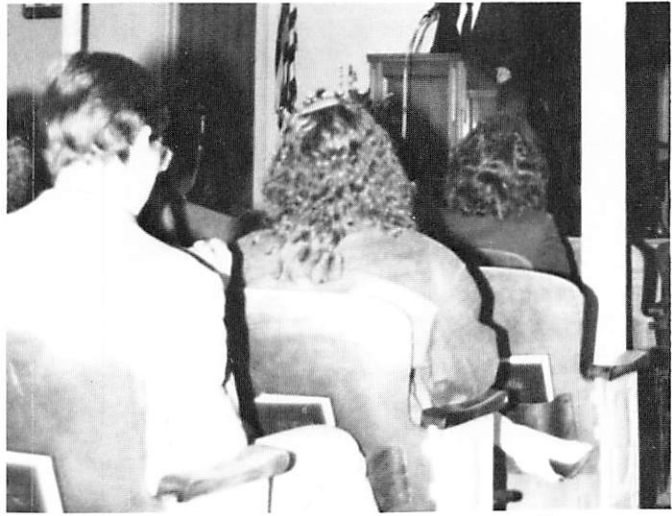
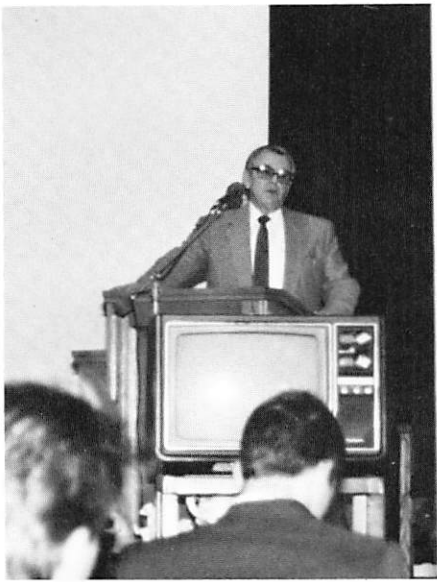
Tom Becker in Concert

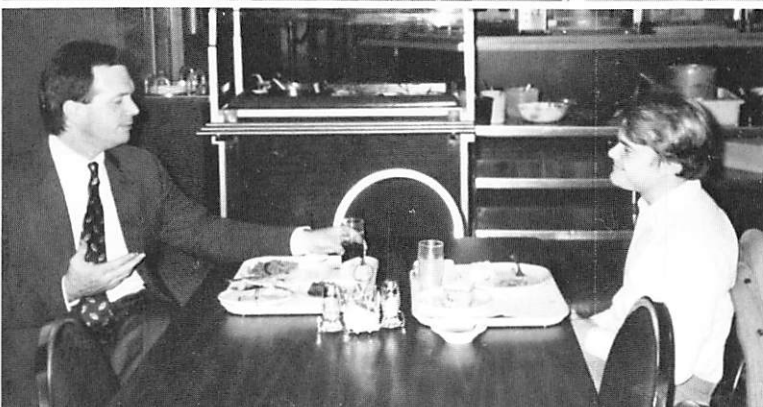
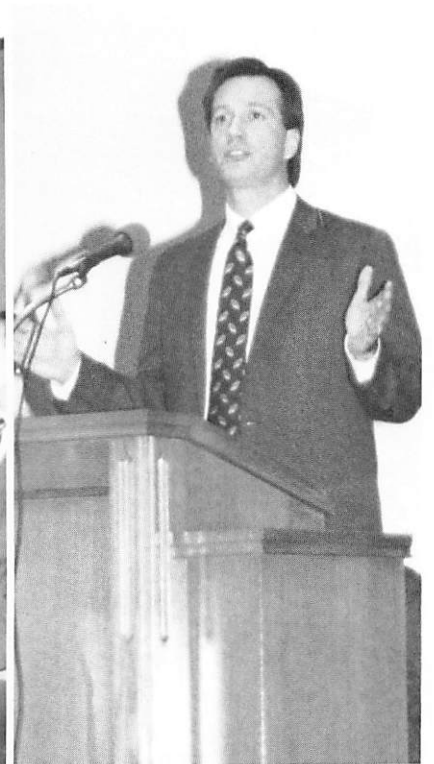


Winter Revival

You did not have to be a Salvationist to have enjoyed this chapel.

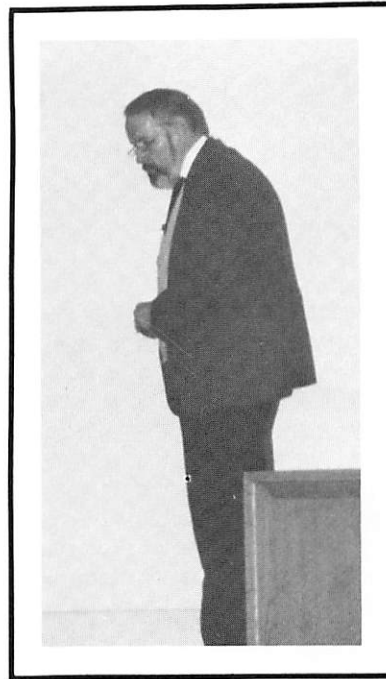
"Thoughts At Midnight; Adoniram Judson Remembers"

A monologue by Dr. Peter Stine

Adoniram Judson was brought back to life before our eyes as Dr. Peter Stine voiced the stirring monologue of Mr. Judson's life. He set the scene in Adoniram's early years with his family, his schooling, and his philosophies. One could sense the tug of war that took place in young Adoniram's life between the "educated beliefs" of a school peer and the spiritual teachings of his father.

In the end, God won out and Adoniram gave thirty-seven fruitful years of service as a missionary to Burma. "When he died at sea on April 12, 1850, no hymn was sung, no prayer was uttered, no scripture was quoted — his body was simply dropped into the Indian Ocean."

Dr. Peter Stine is professor of English and the chairman of the English Department at Gordon College. He is a member of the Vennard Board of Trustees.

Doug West - "There was a lot of spiritual input and the Spirit's presence could be felt."

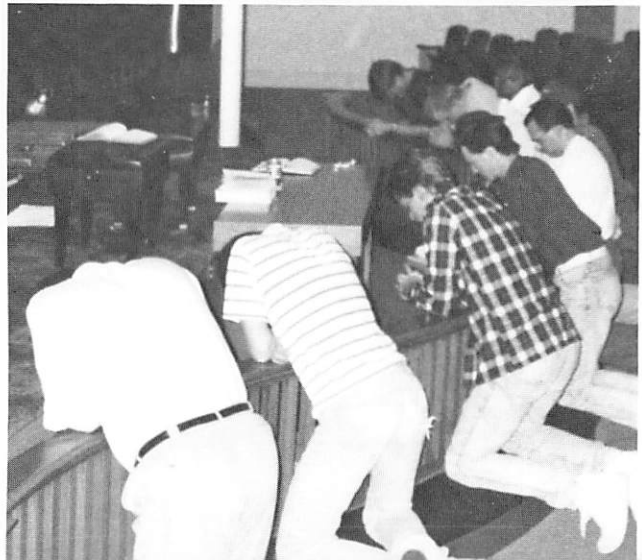
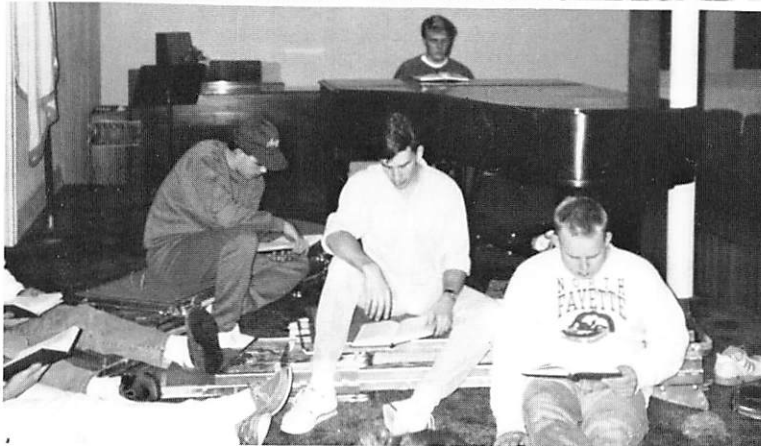
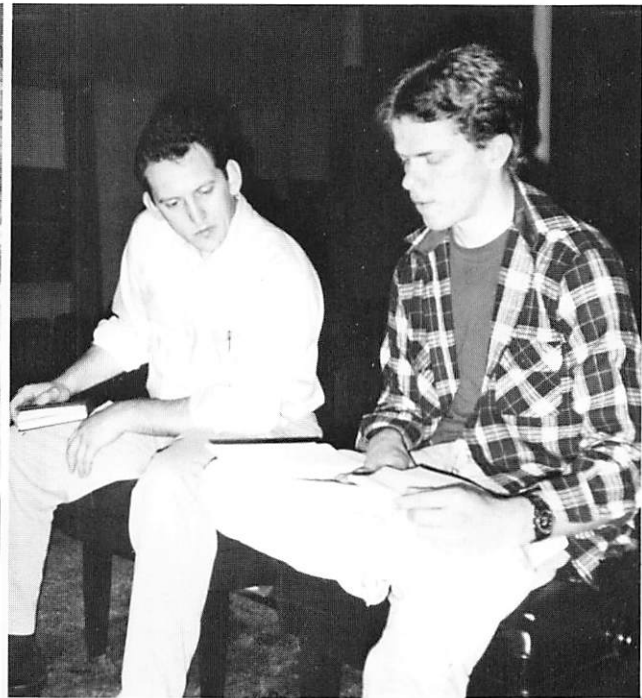
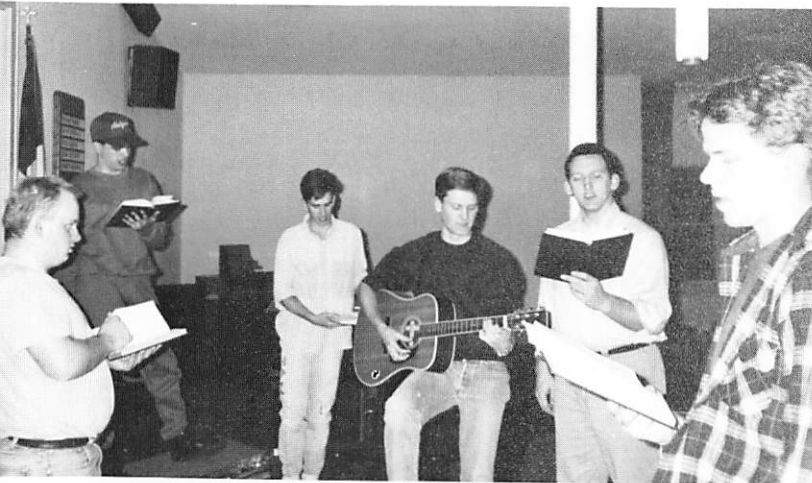
Chris Lovaas - "Prayer meeting is a time where we come together as brothers to seek God. Through that, He comes and brings revival to our hearts."

Bill Walker - "Prayer meetings are vital to the success of revivals ... prayer changes things. This opportunity provides a chance to contemplate my spiritual condition."

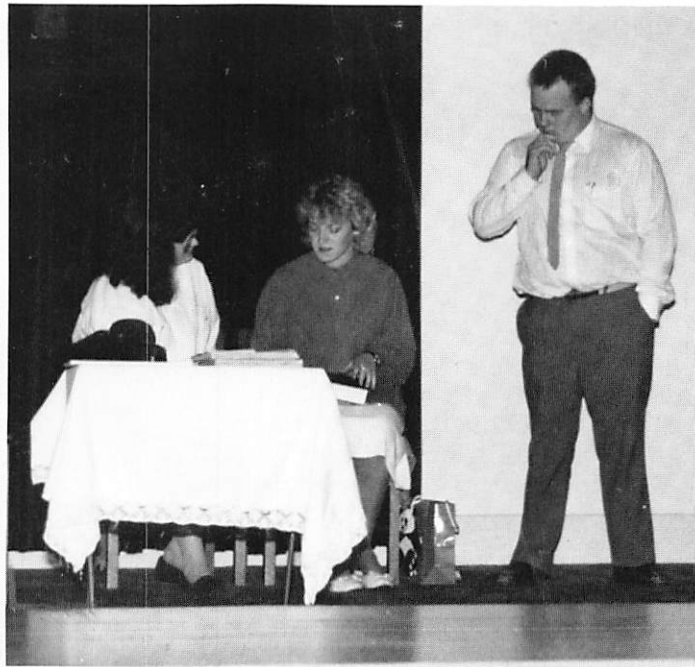
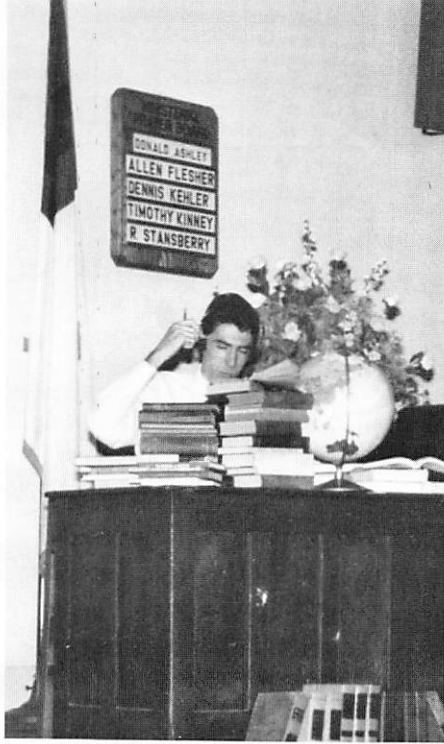

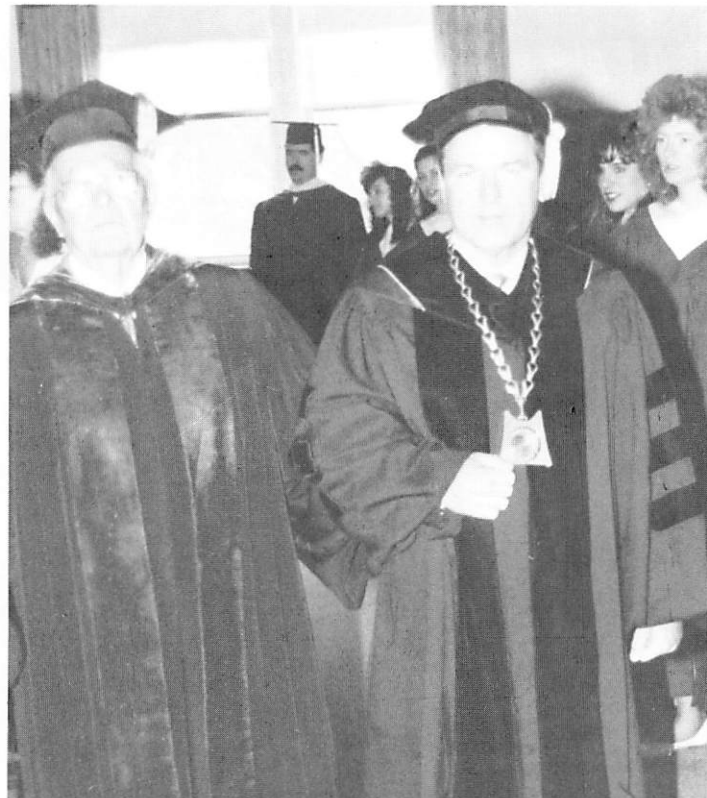

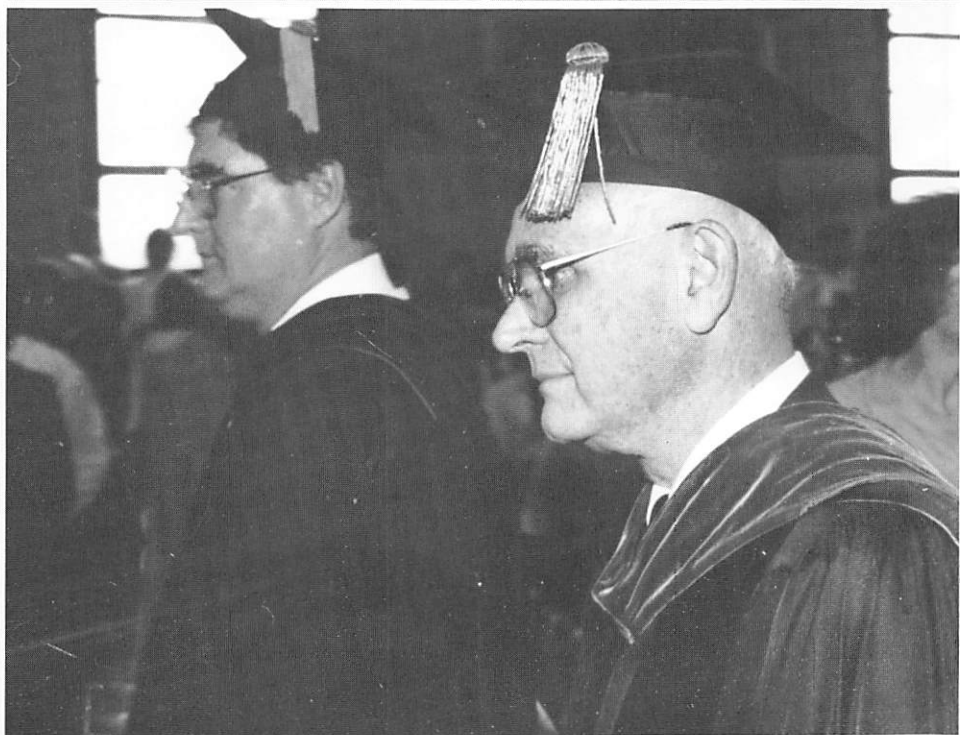

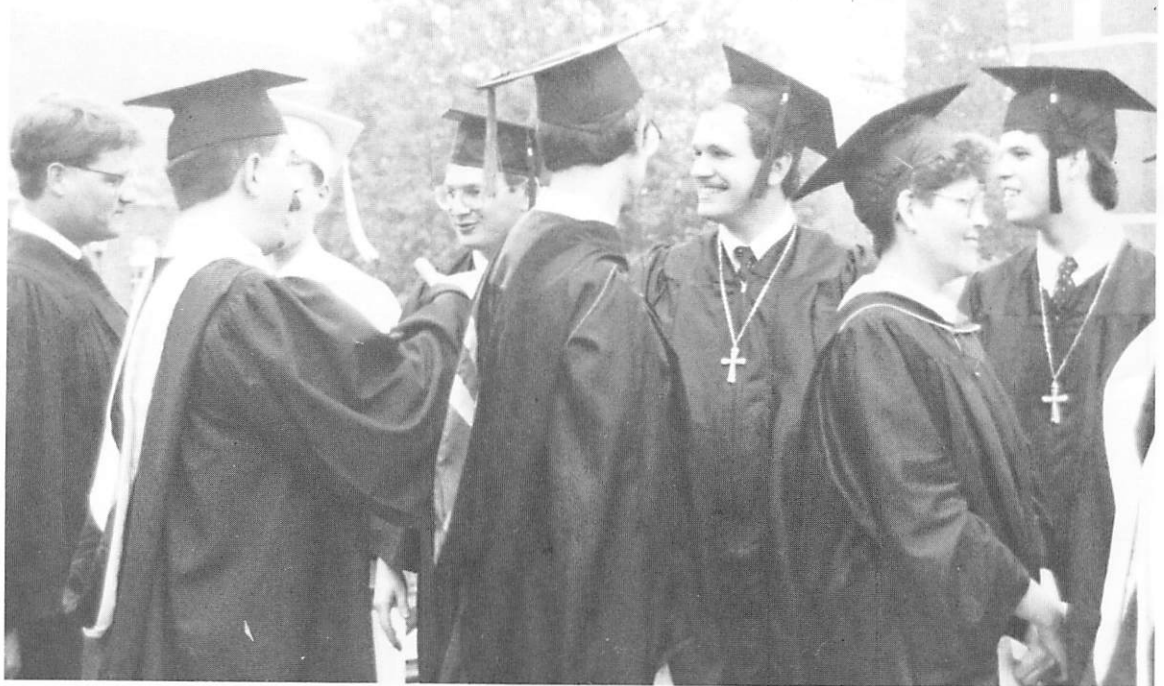

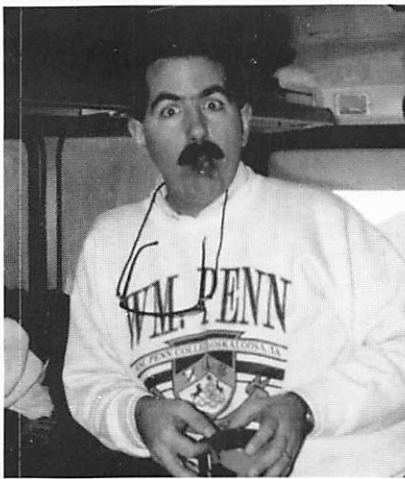
