


Rob Beckham, from WGM's American Indian Field, captured our attention, and some people, to recreate the story of Noah's Ark in chapel.




LECTURESHIPS

THE AGE OF INNOCENCE

Lori Forrester Hyndman was born into a non-Christian home in the early 60's. When Lori was four, her mother and father were divorced after six years of an abusive marriage. Her mom remarried soon thereafter, and life was more normal. Young Lori settled into school and became an above average student. INNOCENCE LOST

When her mother divorced again Lori rebelled and turned on the world around her. At the age of twelve Lori began smoking. She began smoking marijuana and hashish and drinking alcohol at thirteen. At fifteen she regularly took speed.

At fifteen, because of failing grades and a rebellious spirit, Lori quit school and began hanging around with boys who were at least five years older than herself. "Drug dealers and big-time trouble" is how she describes them. She became an accessory in a drug-related murder, but fear of reprisal from the law compelled her to co-operate.

A NEW CONFRONTATION

Through a series of events, Lori and her mother started to attend church. The gospel slowly began to penetrate Lori's heart and mind. During a revival service she and her mother went to the altar and accepted Christ as their Savior. Her mother remained steadfast, but Lori's Christian life was a yo-yo experience. Lori's problems with feelings of ac-

ceptance caused her to fall back in with old friends. She began taking drugs again, this time experimenting with mescalline.

Scriptures that had penetrated Lori's heart during earlier devotions began to draw her back to the Lord. Terrible nightmares about the end of the world caused her to think about her own mortality. Something had to change. She started back to church and began trying to earn her salvation by quitting her smoking and drinking. However, because of her love of dancing, she continued to hang out in bars with her old friends. A TURNING POINT

One Saturday night a friend asked her as to why she always left the bar early. Lori's reply was that she had to get to bed because of church the next day. To that he said, "If you go to church what are you doing in a bar?"

That remark was a real turning point in Lori's life. Unhappy in her double life she decided to quit fighting God. Lori states, "I was miserable because I wasn't committing myself on either side of the fence."

ENTER MR. RIGHT

One good thing leads to another. Church attendance led to becoming active in her church single's group. It also led her to Ken Hyndman who five months after meeting her would become her life's partner.

Lori and Ken were very active working with the youth in their church. They became the youth pastors and loved what they were doing. Meanwhile, God began to lay a call to prepare for full-time ministry on each of their hearts. Because Ken had a brother attending Vennard, they were familiar with the school. Vennard sounded like one big happy family, but not so big as to be overwhelming.

A NEW CHALLENGE

Since Lori had only finished her sophomore year in high school she was accepted at Vennard provisionally. She would have to complete her GED before starting her junior year in college.

As a psychology major, Lori has had the opportunity to sit in classes that have given her a new perspective. She shares, "I'm being healed while I learn." Her psychology professor, Brad Penn, is not only helpful in class, but a good friend outside of the classroom. Lori calls him her "Barnabas" . . . her encourager.

Words of a song come to Lori's mind when she compares her past and her present - "I'm happier now when I'm sad than I was before when I was glad." There's nothing like being a Christian. Life isn't perfect, but you have Power and Hope on your side.

LIFE AFTER VENNARD

Since Ken's graduation from Vennard, besides pastoring, he also enjoys a work/ministry relationship with the developmentally disabled at the Christian Opportunity Center. Lori expects to graduate from Vennard Magna Cum Laude for which she gives God the praise. If something in the area of alcohol and drug rehabilitation counseling opens for her, then they would consider staying in the area.

Whatever happens, they both want God's will in their lives!

Jason Comstock-A Second Chance At Life

Jason, the youngest of three boys, is the son of Bonnie and Dean Comstock of Oskaloosa, Iowa. Other than a "convulsion" that hospitalized him as a baby, his childhood was quite normal. Life was filled with trikes, bikes, sandboxes and cars ... Oh how he loved cars! All of this was shared with his two brothers, Darian and Jim.

Jason was the shadow of Darian who was only fourteen months older. If Darian got in trouble, Jason got in trouble. One day the family went to help paint his grandmother's house. During the noon meal someone realized that Jason and Darian were missing. A search led them outside where they found two very happy boys busily painting the green part of the house white.

When Jim brought home a Heinz 57 variety black and white pup, Jason adopted her as his very own. For the next eighteen years he and Skeeter became "friends forever." Skeeter followed Jason, slept in his bed, and even had her first pups at the foot of his sleeping bag while he slept.

Between Jason's tenth and eleventh year he complained that his arms tingled, but Bonnie did not think it was serious. Then one day, in the midst of a conversation, Jason quit talking. When asked what was wrong, he did not respond. Jason was taken to a local doctor who referred them to Iowa City. There they discovered that he was experiencing

psycho motor seizures. The reason was not to be known until later.

During high school Jason was a loner, choosing to do things at home rather than with his peers. He loved spending time with cars, taking them apart, fixing them and putting them back together. More than anything, he wanted to be able to drive.

After graduating from high school, Jason enrolled as a Business Major at Vennard. Always a full-time student, he spread his educational load over a five-year period. In spite of his problems, Jason was almost always cheery and upbeat, playful and teasing. His favorite saying to those who returned his playfulness was, "Don't worry, I don't get mad, I get even." There were good days and bad days, and until his junior year, life was manageable. Then the seizures began to come oftener and were more intense. It was getting more difficult for Jason to retain things he had just studied. The Comstocks knew that something had to be done, but they did not know what. Even with mega doses of medication Jason's seizures came all too frequently.

One day the doctor suggested to Bonnie that Jason might be a candidate for brain surgery. A new technique had been developed that had been successful for some people. The thought of brain surgery petrified her, but after pursuing the facts, they decided to take the next step.

In the summer of 1991 Jason was taken to Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota for testing to see if he would qualify for this surgery. After two weeks of thorough examination the decision was made to proceed.

Many people across the United States prayed for Jason and his family. Because of those prayers the Comstocks experienced a wonderful peace in the midst of their storm. Bonnie shares, "God wrapped His arms around us as never before."

Surgery that was supposed to last ten hours was successfully completed in eight and one-half hours. Jason was to remain in the Intensive Care Unit for forty-eight hours, but was in his room less than twenty hours after surgery. His brothers immediately dubbed him "Ghandi" because of the seemingly miles of gauze bandage on his head. Except for contracting sterile meningitis, which set Jason back a few days, his recovery was amazing. To God be the glory.

It has been over six months since Jason's surgery to remove the center section of the temporal lobe area, the hippocampus, which had either failed to develop, or had pulled away. He has not had one seizure since that day. One out of three post-op patients have seizures after surgery, but that has not been the case for Jason.

Jason's "crowning day" came recently when he received his driver's license. What does it feel like not to be chauffeured around by one's parents or friends? "Wonderful freedom!" remarks Jason. If one cannot find him at home these days it's probably because he's out "cruising in his Ford Mustang."

Following graduation Jason plans to enter business at the management level. He triumphantly shares, "You can be a conqueror if you trust in the

Lord!"















The serves were tremendous! The power at the net stupenden-


ous! The recovery superb!






COUGAR BASKETBALL












