President's

A New Day Dawning

The path of the righterous is like the first gleam of dawn, shining ever brigher till the full light of day. Proverbs 4:18

It is no secret this College has gone through a period of deep darkness. In mid-December 1995 the midnight hour arrived for Vennard College. The light went out; the heat went off. The darkness and cold enveloped this campus like a shroud. There was an awesome and eery emptiness in these buildings which spelled the end of a grand old institution. But, in the midst of the darkness and cold and emptiness, there were stirrings of new life.

There was hope of a resurrection. There was a determined faith that God was not yet finished with Vennard College. Even as the doors were being closed for what was to be the last time there were many constituents who were desperately and doggedly holding onto God for a means whereby this College could be saved from extinction. There was only one organization that appeared to have any potential for rescuing the campus. That organization was the Vennard College Alumni Association. The Alumni Association Board began discussing the possibility of purchasing the campus from the old corporation, which was being dissolved, and re-opening the College. In many ways this appeared to be a mountain that was almost too large to climb and too big to tunnel through. However, the Alumni Association Board, with a great deal of outside encouragement, made the awesome decision to put their faith on the line to offer to purchase the campus with the hope of re-opening the College. Consequently an offer to purchase was submitted in February 1996. The offer was rejected with an indication that the minimum which would be accepted would be \$400,000. In March 1996 the Alumni Association Board made the offer of purchase for \$400,000, believing that God would somehow provide the means to accomplish this task.

On April 3, 1996 the offer was accepted with the provision that the campus and the Schaum apartments would remain on the market and if an offer to purchase either one or both higher than the one offered was submitted, the Alumni Association would have 72 hours to choose to close the sale or lose the property. The odds seemed insurmountable. However, the agreement was signed and the closing date was set for June 5, 1996. After many long, cold nights a bit of light was beginning to dispel the darkness. However, the only assurance of any success in this "stab in the dark" venture was faith in God and a determination on the part of many people that they would pursue what they believed to be God's direction. It was truly a demonstration of the faith that "is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see." Hebrews 11:1. Due to the provision of the 72 hour notice if there was another buyer, the Alumni Association was forced to seek guaranteed funding to protect the purchase. Consequently, a loan application was submitted to the Jacob Engle Foundation for \$400,000, knowing that the Lord alone could get approval for such a loan. That loan was approved on April 29, 1996. This was a miracle! In actuality, the Alumni Association was forced to close one week early on the Schaum apartments. Had the loan not been in place, that building would have been lost. Finally, on June 6, 1996 the transaction was completed. The College now belonged to the Vennard College Alumni Association. In the meantime, following the purchase agreement on April 3, 1996, the Alumni Association called a meeting wherein the Alumni Board and 13 potential Board of Trustees members met on April 20, 1996 in Des Moines, Iowa. During that meeting a Management Board was appointed to start the process of bringing Vennard College back into existence. I was appointed the Coordinator of this Management Board. At that point, reorganization started seriously with the primary focus of fund-raising to pay toward campus acquisition, and start-up operations. However, there were limitations on what could be accomplished until the sale of the campus was completed on June 3, 1996. Following June 3, we began to gear up for renewed operations. The first appointment was Steve Mills as academic dean. On July 10, 1996 I flew to Iowa from Pennsylvania to manage campus operations and seriously begin to organize the renewal process. Mrs. Prudy Olson was then hired to start the process of Student Recruitment for school

starting September 3, 1996. There were only about 10-weeks left to recruit! During that week, Arden Selden was contacted regarding the Campus Manager position. He came from Indiana to visit the campus on June 14, 1996. He was on campus working within about 3-weeks. Several other persons began working for the College, at least on a temporary basis. These included John Olson, Lois Klein, Lila Faust, Ann-Marie McCray, and a few other volunteers. It was a very small and frightening beginning. But it was the beginning. Now, keep in mind that we gained access to this campus just 15 months ago Today!!! That was the break of dawn! The best way I know to describe the state of the College is enumerate some of what has happened in the last 15 months.

I am absolutely delighted to share with you in the 1997-1998 President's Convocation that God has been faithful to a fault in performing this miracle during the past 15 months. Although I assumed the responsibilities of the Presidency of Vennard College on August 20, 1996, I did not arrive on campus to stay until October 16, 1996. The President's Convocation was held on September 20, 1996 in conjunction with the Board of Trustees's meeting. At that time I used the theme, "On the Wings of Eagles." Little did I realize at that time just how true it would be. Taht God was about to allow us to mount up with wings as eagles and let us run and not be weary and let us walk and not be faint, was but a lofty goal. In reality, as we have corporately waited on the Lord, He has helped us to do just that. There is no other explanation for what has happened which has brought us to this point. I am reminded of the Scripture in Deuteronomy 32:10-12 which describes the experience of Jacob:

In a desert land he found him, in a barren and howling waste. He shielded him and cared for him; he guarded him and cared for him; he guarded him as the apple of his eye, like an eagle that stirs up its nest and hovers over its young, that spreads its wings to catch them and carries them on its pinions. The Lord alone led him; no foreign god was with him.

We recognize that there is a New Day Dawning for Vennard College!

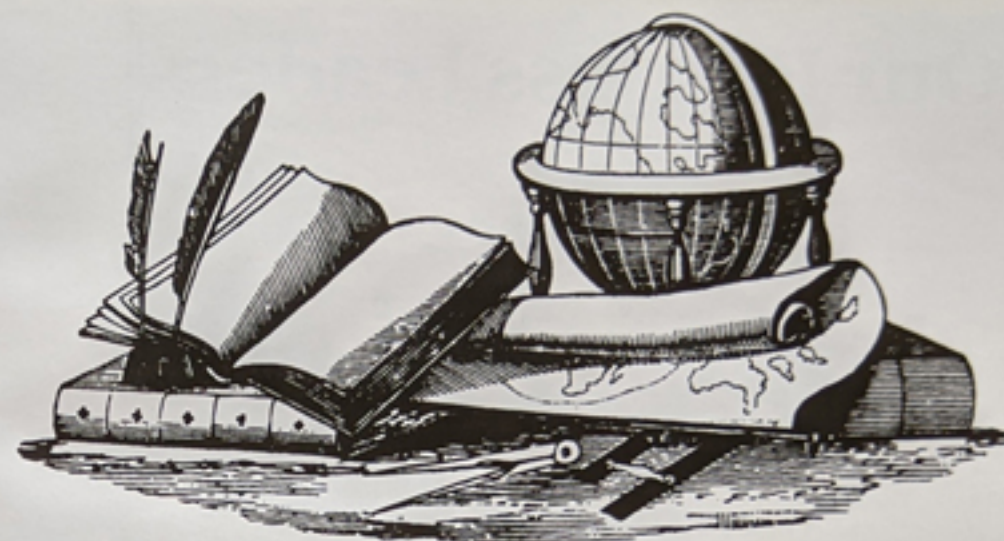

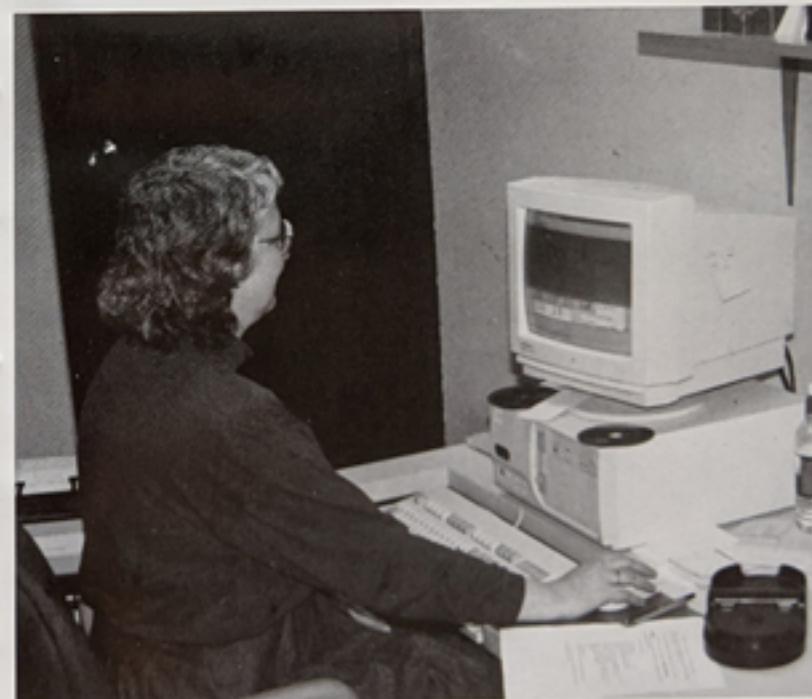

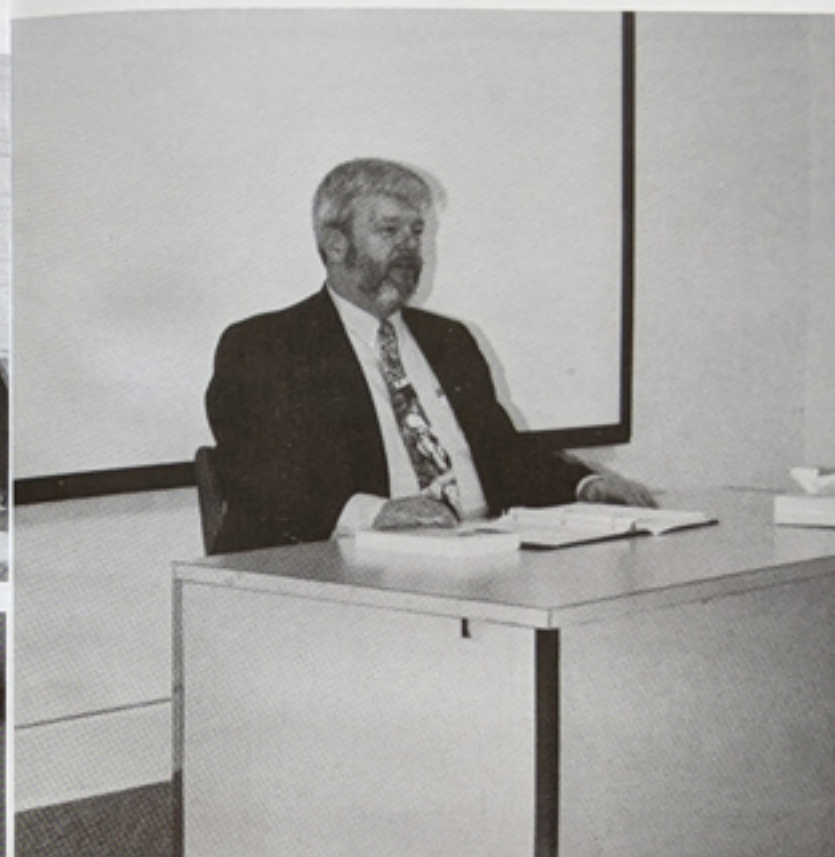

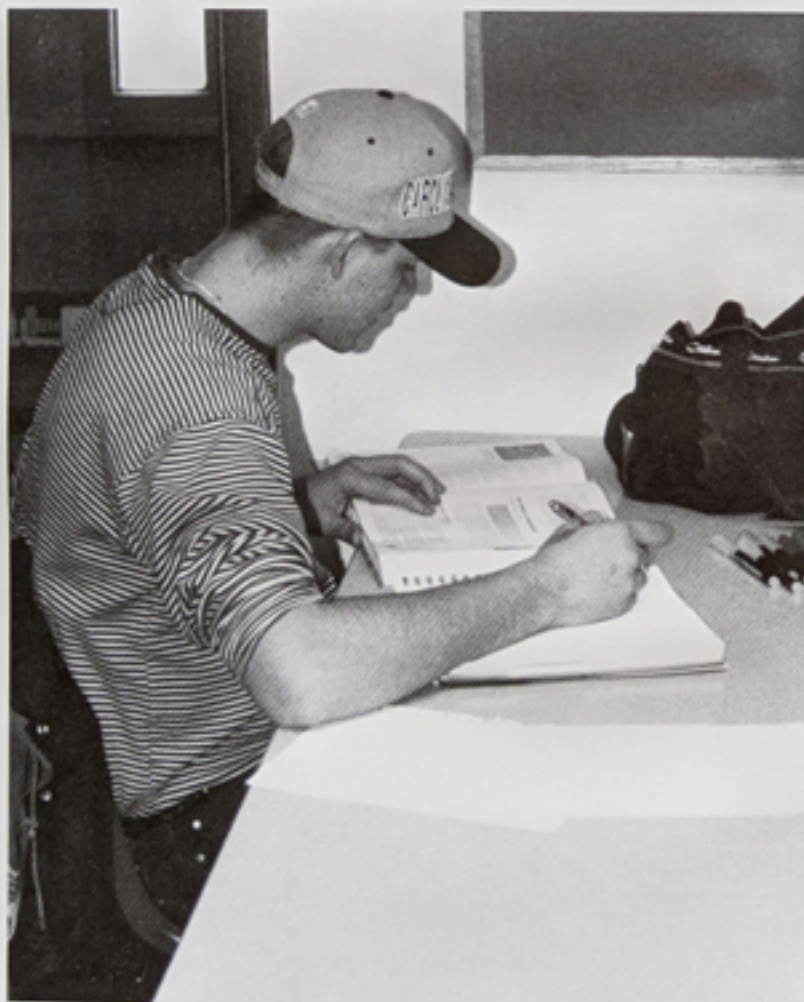

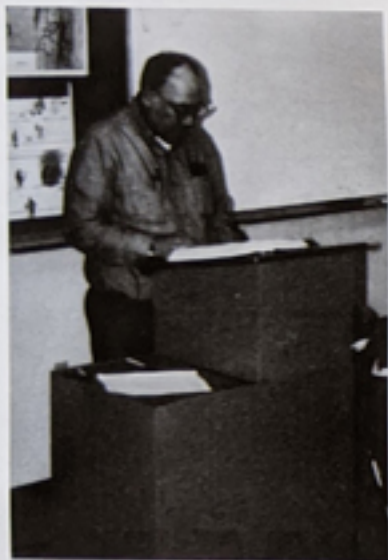

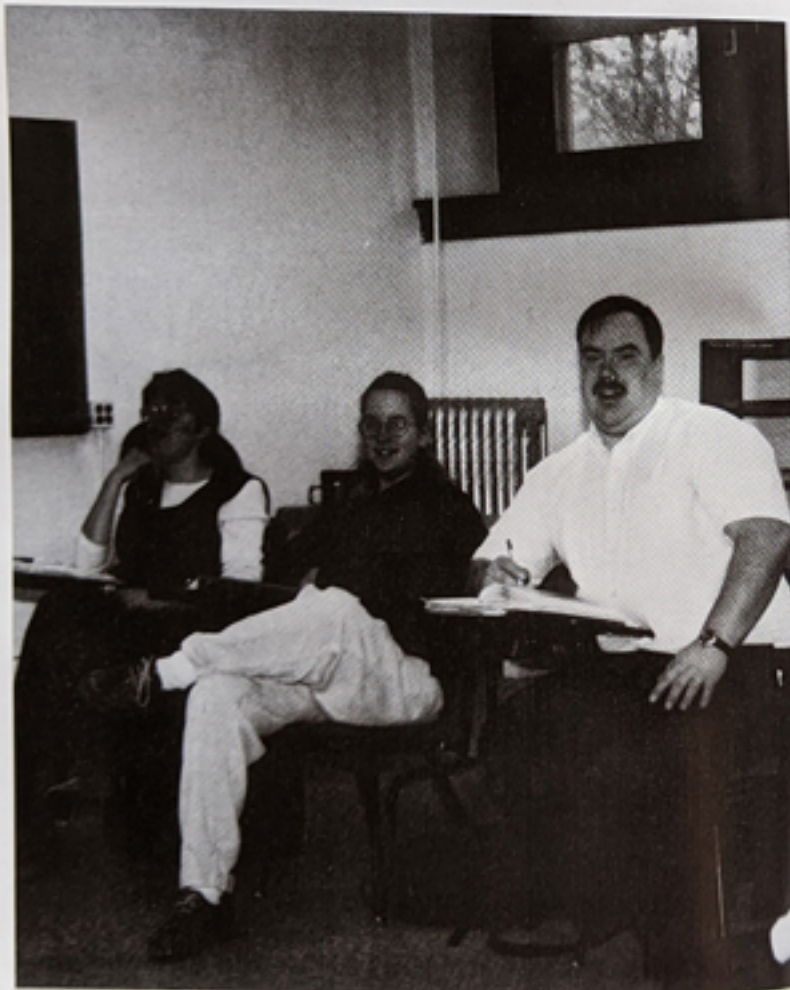

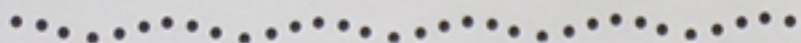

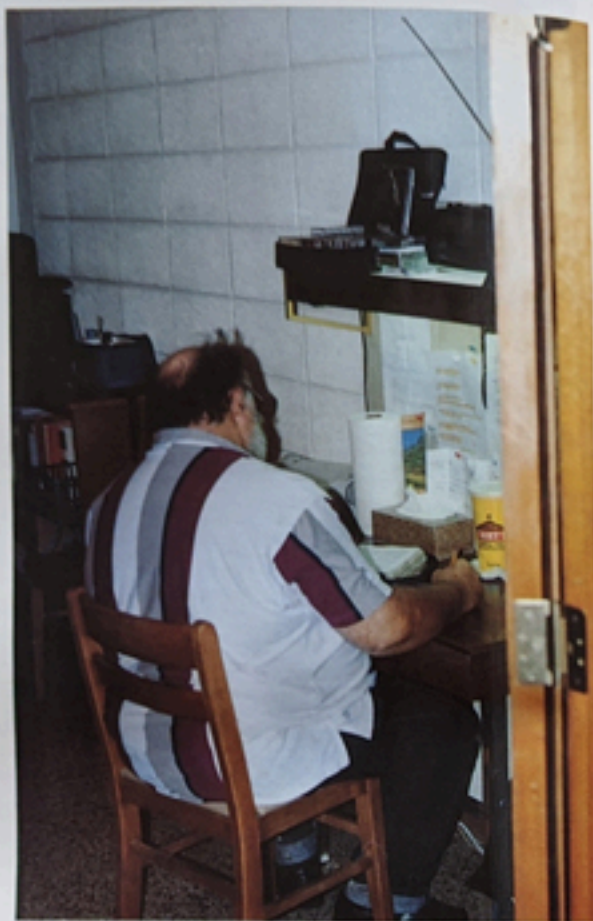

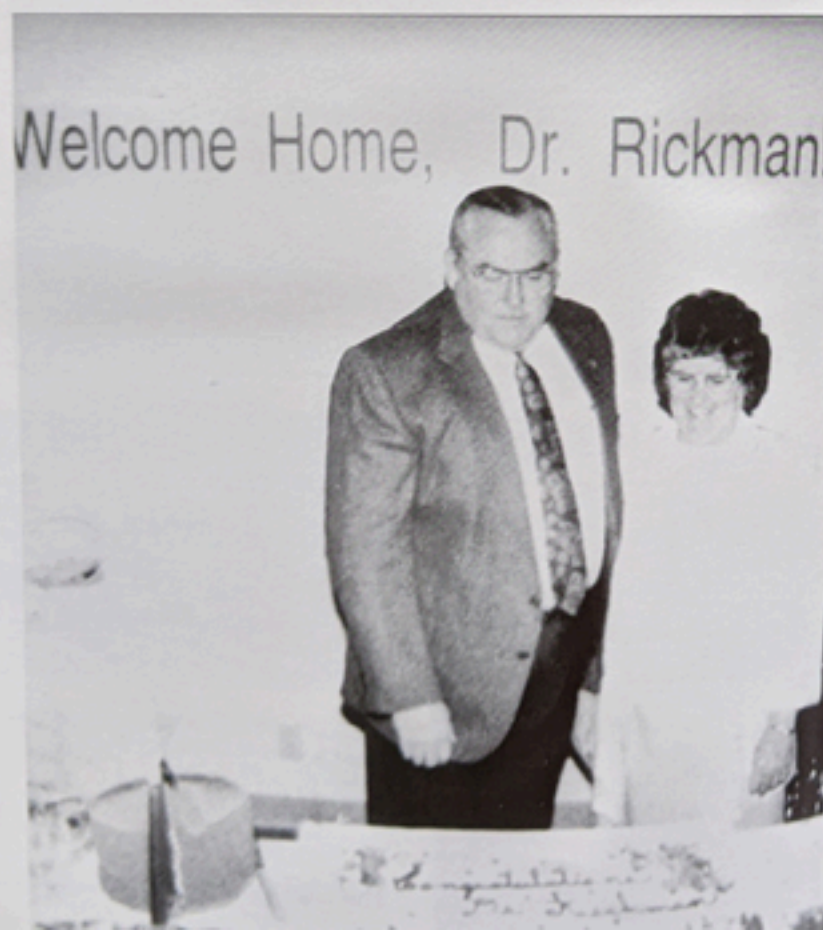

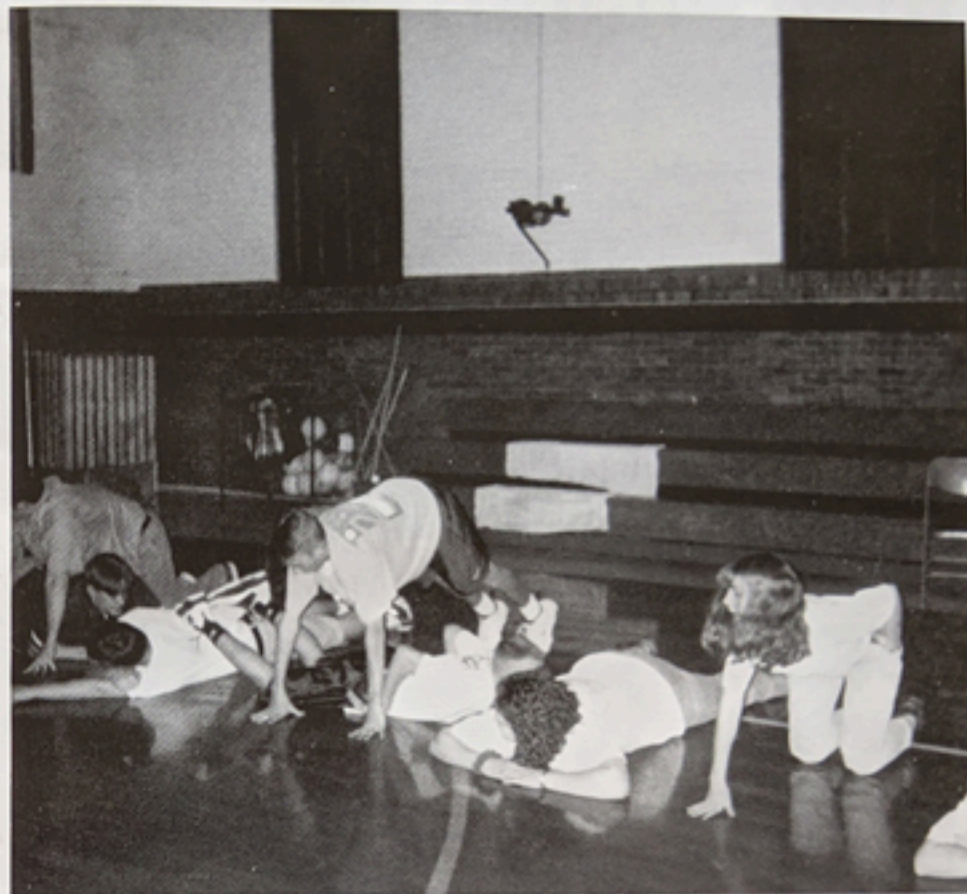

San Juan Pueblo, Honduras, Central America

"In the States our idea of poverty is a black and white tv and an unpaid phone bill," Frank Robbins said on the way out to San Juan Pueblo. However, for the people in this town on the Northern Coast of Honduras, a telephone and running water are luxuries. San Juan Pueblo is a town where the fields truly "are white unto harvest." (John 4:35) My experience in Honduras made me realize that despite people's culture their need of the Gospel is still very real. On our first evangelistic trip to the people I shared my purpose for being in San Juan Pueblo, and told them about what Jesus can do for them. Two young teenagers surrendered their

lives to God. A week later, others also received Christ. At every church service people would ask, "How can I be a Christian?" This church, Iglesia San Juan Pueblo Evangelica de Santidad (Evangelical Holiness Church of San Juan Pueblo) has grown from 6 to nearly 70 in only 4 months. People want Jesus Christ! They want a true faith in Jesus Christ. In the United States people want to run from the truth of the Gospel. Here, we have a church on just about every city block, and people complain about the sermon being too long, singing too many songs, or not having enough fellowship.

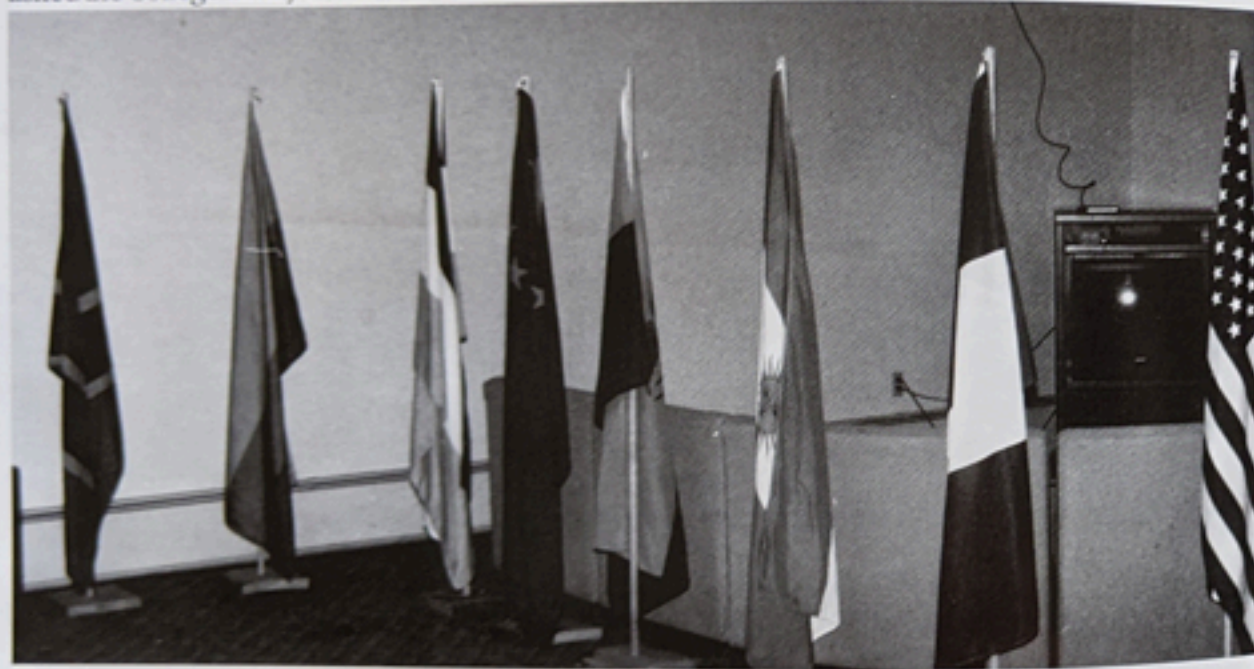

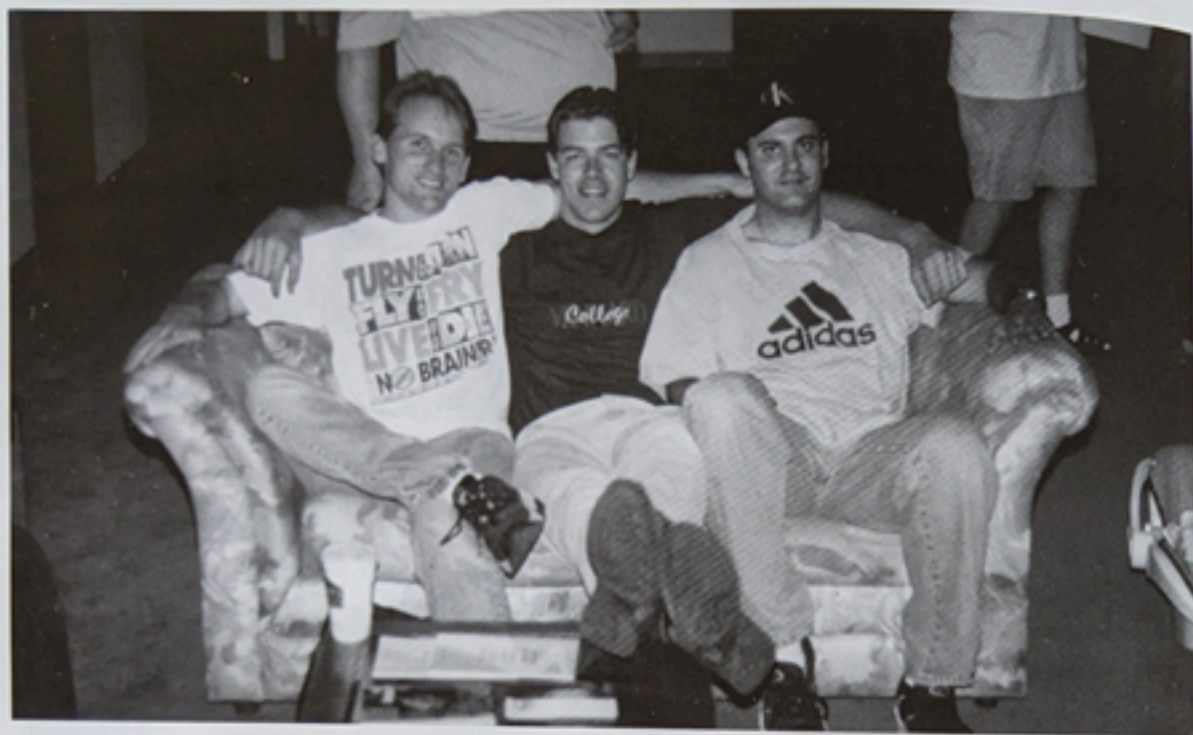

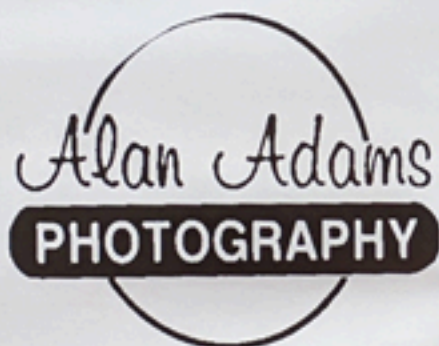
